KOOCHICHING!

Extracts from the Koochiching Border Budget of Aug. 14, 1902:

"On Wednesday of last week Messrs. Rockwood, Backus, Trumer, Cook, McCrea and Nutter, representing the Koochiching Townsite Company, arrived at this place and spent some time looking over their interests here.

Mr. Rockwood and associates have labored diligently during the past seven or eight years to interest people of means in the development of the water power at this place and have at last succeeded, the only obstacle in the way now being the consent of the Ontario government to allow them to develop the power.

It is estimated that upwards of \$1,500,000 will be expended on the water power within the next two years, in building a dam, pulp and paper mills and saw mills; in fact it is stated that one of the largest and best equipped saw mills in Minnesota will be built at Koochiching.

Mr. Backus is a prominent lumberman of Minneapolis. He stated that between five and six million dollars would be expended in building the railroad, developing the water power and building mills at this place and Fort Frances.

Everything at present goes to show that something is going to be done at once and comes as good news to many who have spent the past seven or eight years here, none of them, however, wavering the least in their opinion that Koochiching would one day be what has long been prophesied, one of the largest manufacturing centers in Minnesota."
