Gateways for Parks.
 The park board has let the contract to Andrew Nelson for the construction of gates and gateways at the Southside park. Three of these gates will be erected, one on the corner of Ash street and Central avenue and two on Central avenue. The piers of the gateways will be constructed of stone and red brick while the arched roofs will be finished off in red tile. The swinging gates will be constructed of iron. The gateways will be handsome in architecture and will add greatly to the beauties of the park.
