**Running to Capacity.**  
Orders are coming in as fast as they can be filled and the Gopher Heading and Manufacturing company of Cook, in which several local business men are interested, is running its factory to capacity. A meeting of the board of directors was held at the Johnson Supply Company store last evening. Only routine business was transacted. Contracts for several large orders have not yet been signed by the company but are being considered and action may be taken soon. Thirty men are employed in the factory which has been running to capacity since the first of the year.
