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"DUCK HIM AGAIN" SAYS HEROINE; DEAF MUTE READS "MOVIE" TALK

MINNEAPOLIS, May 6.—"Talking Movies" are no novelty to Fred G. Hertlett, Chicago's deaf mute who is one of the visitors to the convention of the Motion Picture Exhibitors' association of the Northwest in the West Hotel. It requires no talking machine with the action of the films to make the pictures "audible," for he reads the lips of the actors on the screen.

Through the pantomime of the performers runs conversation which sometimes touches of the most dramatic or pathetic scenes with droll comedy. Mr. Hertlett, through his ability to interpret the side remarks of motion picture subjects is in much the same confidential position as the catch in the orchestra pit who can frequently make to those in the wings.
