When it Was Platted; Its Early Settlers, and When They Came Here; How it is Growing in Size, &c.
Talks about Business Men and Professional Men, with Some Items About their Sisters and their Cousins and their Aunts.

The few we have enumerated present a total of over 50,000 dollars, yet the list is very far from being complete. There are five new buildings contracted for since our last issue and a strong probability or two more being added to the list to-day. The increased population around town during the two last months within two miles north and south and six miles east and west is very nearly 700 new settlers. Perhaps you don't take this in; but it is a fixed fact, and they're here to-day. A large colony from Niles, Mich., will be here soon,

FERAN & DADY,

proprietors of the "Senate" sample rooms commenced operations Aug. 17, 1880. They have one of the best buildings in town, size 20x44, two stories high. Their bar is stocked with choice imported and domestic liquors and cigars and they have a fine billiard and pool table. Louis B. Feran the senior member of the firm came to this state in 1877 from the south. He is a Mainite by birth. Eugene Dady the other partner is American born and came to this state in 1855. "Barney" and "Gene" have earned a reputation that they may be proud of. The "Senate" is a gentlemen's place of resort, and when a patron ceases to behave as such he is firmly but politely told that he is not wanted around the place. Every body likes them and admires the order and cleanliness; freedom from noise and confusion, which is always to be found there.

another well known citizen, is the chairman of the board of county commissioners, and agriculturist. He is also superintendent of the

not to look for a location, for they have got one already, but to settle down on the land picked out and secured for them by their agent. All these people bring their produce into Warren, and buy or receive their goods here and transact all their business in town.

SHIPMENTS OF WHEAT.

The estimated shipments of wheat from this station, this season is very close to 250,000 bushels; a QUARTER OF A MILLION BUSHELS of No. 1, HARD. It's a big pile of wheat, is this amount, but we'll take warehouse and railroad figures to prove this, when the season finishes. We have six farms here which will aggregate over half this amount, and a large number that will run from four to eight thousand bushels. Come and see us, you famished citizens of a country where your horses die of epizootic and where your cemeteries are full of "half grown" graves; come and secure a lot and put up a house and bring your family (if you have one; and if not, get one) and come and live with us. We haven't got any gold mines, or "sich" but we will guarantee that the man who secures a quarter section of the land near Warren will find a better fortune than a gold mine, if he will only run a plow, a seeder and a few other agricultural implements over it.

INDIVIDUALS.

Under this head we propose to give a brief sketch of our advertisers and others in business here making a complete history of their business interests etc. Where we cannot obtain a full account, we shall estimate the same, and take care of the result.

M. J. McCANN,
came to this place in April, 1879, from Eau Claire. He commenced his business one year afterward. The shop is 22x30 feet a good substantial structure with "grouted" walls. Two forges are going at full blast and the cheery ringing of "Mike's" anvils makes lasting music. As a general blacksmith, he has no superior in the valley and his business is large and increasing. He is a native of Michigan and has large farming interests, as well as other possessions here and elsewhere. This artisan has sharpened over seventeen hundred plow points this season, besides his other work, and this one item will give some little idea of the amount of breaking and plowing that is being done near here.

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A. P. MCINTYRE,
another well known citizen, is the chairman of the board of county commissioners, and agriculturist. He is also superintendent of the

Close Bros, farms. Came here in May, 1878, and settled with his family the next year. "Al" hails from the badger state and came to Minnesota in 1857. The seductive smile which "Al" adopts when speaking of the particular merits of some pieces of land is irresistible and he generally makes the sale.

are next in order, and this is where we strike it rich. This firm have three stores: in Faribault, Crookston and Warren, respectively. Their place of business in each town is a land mark and they are full jeweled in every respect. C. A. Wells is the highfaluting cuss who presides over the destinies of this branch. Their stock is large and prices low. "Al" will rig you out in a costly gold watch or a cheaper but reliable silver "ticker" of any make desired. This firm will build here shortly, and they have already purchased the site. They commenced business three months ago in this place.

located here in June this year, but is as well known as many of the older residents. He came here from Wisconsin, and is a native of New York city. Is a graduate of Miami college, Ohio. The doctor has had a number of critical cases since his advent, but he has brought them through. He is not simply a physician, but he is also a surgeon of a very high order of merit. Altogether, "Doc" Beach is a valuable acquisition to this place, and he is sought after far and near. His office is at the Warren house.

TITUS & WHITNEY,

are a sort of "multum in parvo" firm, and their store is chuck full of a little of most everything and considerable of some other things. J. B. Titus the senior member was one of the earliest settlers here coming early in 1878. He first held the office of station agent and operator at Stephen after which he came to this place and filled the same position for over two years, resigning to look after more important affairs. "J. B. T." is a sort of village papa. He is one of the first in every scheme for the advancement of the village, and his hand goes away down in his pocket, very frequently, to make good deficiencies in some public project. He is the county treasurer of Marshall county; is American express agent, etc. He is familiarly known as "Tite." E. F. Whitney, the other member of the firm hails from Waldo co., Maine, and came to this state in 1871; to this county eight years afterward. He and his partner are both extensive farmers and liberal, public spirited men. Their drug store is replete with a large assortment of drugs, paints, oils, varnishes, notions, tobaccos, cigars, etc., and their trade is growing. They are reliable druggists and exercise great care in preparing prescriptions. Both are temperance men, but they have been very kind to the hard drinker (that means us) who presides over the SHEAF, and he scarcely, well; hardly ever enters their emporium without being offered a drink—in fact the contents of the acid, skunk's oil, painkiller and other bottles of that description are freely his at any time when thirsty. They are agents for the celebrated Kimball pianos, organs and melodeons, and their sales are heavy and rapidly on the increase.
