World's Fair Letter.

We arrived in Chicago early on Thursday morning late and hearty after an all-night rest in one of the luxurious sleeping apartments furnished by the Chic. Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway. Almost our first acquaintance in the city was getting acquainted with the keeper of a restaurant opposite the Union depot who charged \$1.10 for some poor coffee and steak and four bananas for myself and wife. I may as well remark here, however, that our subsequent experience with the fellows has been more satisfactory. Food and lodging can be obtained here, except on the grounds, just as cheaply as anywhere else in the United States. Great hotels have been built in the vicinity of the fair for the accommodation of visitors and the greater number of these hotels are amply filled with guests. Leaving our wives at the depot, Mr. Ostrom and myself started out to find a stopping place, and we naturally drifted toward the Fair which is located about seven miles from the center of the city. We secured good rooms at the Security Hotel, a Minnesota enterprise, projected by the late Col. Hans Mattsson. We found the genial Capt. H. Eustrom, formerly of Hancock Minn., in charge, and he made us feel "at home" but in a moment he told us large, well built, cool and airy, and is neatly furnished. Julian Hawthorne, the son of Nathaniel Hawthorne, the famous author, is staying here with his wife. The hotel is easily reached from the city by taking the Illinois Central to the Side Station. It is located but a short distance from the grounds on a street car line.

Being well located our next business was to see the Fair, which we did in the afternoon. We thought it wise the first day not to enter any buildings, and view the beautiful and magnificent buildings from the outside. As one takes a stroll towards the Administration building, a scene is presented to the eye that can never be forgotten. One can not but imagine himself transported to fairy land as one beautiful view after another bursts upon the eye. Structure after structure, white, grand, imposing, beautiful in architecture, with an endless array of statuary and sparkling fountains meet the gaze. It is worth a trip to Chicago merely to see the buildings. During the afternoon we registered at the Minnesota building. The most conspicuous thing about said building is Fiedles statue of Hiawatha which is placed at the entrance. It shows an Indian warrior carrying an Indian maiden in his arms, and is supposed to represent the following lines of Longfellow's great epic: "Over wide and rushing rivers, In his arms he bore the maiden."

The state buildings are used principally for headquarters for people from the different states, where they may meet, rest, receive mail, and attend to their correspondence. In the evening we made a tour of Midway Plaisance, which in pure English means the pleasant place in the middle of the ground. Life in this respect is more cheerful and the goose always hangs high. With music, song and dance and other pleasures too numerous to mention, dull care is driven away. Numerous representatives from oriental countries, notably Persia, and their red turbans, wadded to their throats. A buxom young lady stood at a doorway, and that proved too drawing a card for Mayor Ostrom who proposed that we pay 10 cts. each to see the mysteries in her little den. She took us to Jerusalem (by the way she showed us several general pictures. But it was all a fake. Next day we visited the Transportation building and it was very interesting to see the different means of transportation used by man from the earliest times to the present day. Ever since God's curse upon the serpent to man to scatter about on the earth, it has been necessary for him to study the means by which he could transport himself from place to place. Here one can see illustrations of the most primitive modes of locomotion from a bark canoe, and hollowed out of a single log, to a modern steamship, and from a dog sled or ox cart to a palace car of to-day with ponderous engines, making a speed of 112 miles an hour. It would fill a whole book to describe all that we saw in this building, and the SHEAF has not space for more than this short glimpse. It was very interesting to me to study the development of the steam engine as applied to railroads, and it made quite a comparison to see the engine and cars used on the first railroad in the U. S. standing beside an engine and cars of the present. But I must tell of an incident that happened in this building. In some manner I got separated from my wife and the rest of the party, and all my efforts to find them again were fruitless. I then went to the Minnesota building and wandered about in a desultory manner the rest of the day, and did not get united with the party until we met at our hotel in the evening. My wife and Mr. and Mrs. Ostrom had continued to look for me for two hours after they missed me. No use to try to find each other on the grounds if one separated. This finishes our first whole day at the Exposition. The weather has been cool and nice and I do not think we will suffer at all from heat. Let all who can come and see this marvellous Exposition.

School Officer's Meeting.

Meeting was called to order by Supt. O. G. Nelson at 1:50 p. m. Supt. Nelson was elected chairman and W. B. Walters secretary. The following questions were discussed: 1. Shall we have county uniformity in text-books? 2. Who shall select the text-books? 3. What shall be done with the text-books now on hand? County uniformity was first discussed, the meeting voting unanimously in favor of the same. Next followed a discussion in regard to the selection of books. Mr. Anton Hill offered the following resolution: That the county superintendent be requested to appoint a committee of five, including himself, to select a list of text-books for Marshall county. The resolution was adopted unanimously. In proposing the third question for discussion, Supt. Nelson submitted an invoice of the books now on hand at the court house in Warren. This invoice which included "dead stock," amounted to \$773.42. After some discussion the following resolution was offered and unanimously adopted: Resolved, That it is the sentiment of this meeting that the text-books now on hand, and belonging to the county, be distributed among the school districts according to the total enrollment in each district during the present school year. Commissioner's Proceedings.

Proceedings of the County Commissioners of Marshall County, Minn., at their meeting held in Warren, June 26, 1893. Meeting called to order by chairman. Members present, A. L. Nutting, D. B. Bakke, Anton Hill and Peder J. Holan. Absent, E. Dalquist. A petition signed by J. M. Schie and others for the formation of a new school district in the town of New Folden, granted a hearing at the next regular meeting. Inquiry was made of the County Auditor, concerning bid received for the purchase of the \$12,000 Marshall County Refunding Bonds, and bids being referred by said officer that no bids had been received, adjourned until the following day. 9 o'clock a. m., June 27, 1893. Meeting called to order by chairman, members present, A. L. Nutting, Anton Hill and P. J. Holan, absent, D. B. Bakke and E. Dalquist. The bids submitted for the purchase of Bonds being only two in number were opened examined and rejected, the bids not stating positively what the bonds would be negotiated for. On motion it was resolved that new bids be advertised for by the County Auditor in the "American Banker" a weekly paper published in New York, said bids to be opened Thursday, July 20, 1893.
