— Editor C. C. Knappen, of the Fisher Bulletin, was snowbound here on Thanksgiving Day and had to spend several days in the city. He didn't seem to mind it much, however, but on the contrary appeared thankful.

— The Supper and Auction Sale at the opera house on Thanksgiving evening netted the ladies of the Swedish Luth. church the snug sum of \$112, which is very good considering the storm which prevented a large attendance.

— Martin Sanaker, the banker, at Fisher, Minn., committed suicide by shooting himself on Sunday morning last. His business affairs were in excellent shape, it is said, and the cause of his sad deed is attributed to ill health. Mr. Sanaker was born at Calmar, Winnisheik Co., Iowa, 38 years ago and has lived at Fisher during the past seventeen years.

— The past month has been the coldest November in the memory of the "oldest inhabitant." It has been steady cold weather with no "snow ball" days mixed in between. This cold, crisp, brazing, invigorating atmosphere is conducive to health, they tell us, and it is a noteworthy fact that very little sickness has existed during the past month. We have also more snow than has seldom, if ever, been seen at this time of the year. A "white winter" is the sign of a bountiful crop, they tell us, and we all hope that is true.

— The farm residence of Mrs. Snelling, a widow residing at Angus, Minn., was totally destroyed by fire this morning together with its entire contents. The hired man, John Subalic, arose at daylight and prepared to do the chores. The lantern was empty and he attempted to fill it while burning. By mistake the man got hold of a gasoline can and the result was a terrific explosion. Subalic was blown clear through a window, and badly burned about the face and hands. He is also cut quite severely on the neck, one piece of glass narrowly missing the jugular vein. He had presence of mind to roll in the snow and extinguish his burning clothing. Every light of glass in the building was broken out by the explosion. The family sprang from their beds and jumped from the windows in their night clothing as the house was filled with flame in an instant. Not an article was saved from the building, even the clothing of the family being a total loss. No insurance was carried on the building or contents. The members of the family were temporarily cared for by the neighbors.—Crookston Times.

— A fine daughter arrived at the home of Carl Lind on Wednesday last week. Mr. Lind had good reason to feel thankful on Thanksgiving Day.

— The town of Big Woods has a splendid new school building, and teaching was commenced therein last Monday, with Miss Mollie Knutson as teacher.—Argyle Banner.

— The worst snow storm of the season struck the Northwest on Thanksgiving Day, and caused a general suspension of railroad traffic and business for several days. All day the snow flakes flew thick and fast hurled forward by a strong northerly wind, and next day also the operation was continued, and meanwhile it was continually growing colder. The south-bound train on Thursday got only as far as Stephen, where a snowdrift intercepted its advance, and not until Saturday did it proceed to Crookston. No train arrived from the south from Thursday morning until Monday morning. By Saturday morning the blizzard had spent its force, and when the inhabitants of Warren went forth to view their city, it had all the appearance of being barricaded against an invasion by the enemy, by great banks of snow piled high on streets and sidewalks everywhere. Everybody proceeded to shovel snow, and before long streets and sidewalks were again passable.

We have heard of no casualties on account of the blizzard in this vicinity, yet a number of persons are reported frozen to death in the storm in various parts of the Northwest, especially in the Dakotas. Carloads of cattle and sheep that were transported on western railroads perished in the cold, and much suffering has been caused to stock generally on the plains.
