Application made by the supervisors of town of Thief Lake for an appropriation of \$200.00 for a bridge across Thief river was allowed at \$100.00.

Applications for correction of assessment and abatement of taxes made by F. D. Keye, Andrew Johnson, John M. Ryan, J. McCleron, Charles Morin, Karl Menzel and Carrese were recommended to the State Auditor.

Application for correction of assessment and abatement of taxes made by H. L. Melgaard and Fredrika Menzel was rejected.

Application made by Interstate Grain Co., Warren, for correction of taxation (being erroneously assessed in Warren Independent School District instead of District No. 40) was recommended to the State Auditor.

Report of P. Kirsch, county surveyor, of fees collected by him in 1896, amounting to \$132.00, was accepted.

Report of P. J. Holan, County Auditor, of salary and fees collected in 1896, amounting to \$1,230.00, was accepted.

Petition of John Olson and others to have congressional township No. 155 North of Range 41 West, organized as a town, was granted. It is ordered that the same be and hereby is established as the town of "German-town" and bounded as follows: Twp. 155, R. 42 on the West, Twp. 156, R. 41 on the North, Twp. 155, R. 40 on the East and Twp. 154, R. 41 on the South; and it is further ordered that the first town meeting therein be held on the 24th day of February, 1897, at the house of John Olson.

Petition by Aug. Olson and others to disorganize town of Thief Lake was indefinitely postponed.

A resolution in regard to seed grain loan was passed and copies ordered sent to our Senator and Representative in the legislature as follows:

WARREN, MINN., Feb. 5th, 1897. Hon. J. Q. Cronkhite and M. A. Goar, St. Paul, Minn.:

We, the Commissioners of the County of Marshall, State of Minnesota, in special meeting assembled, have, owing to floods and wet spring causing nearly a total failure of crops in this county the past season, discussed, and heard different opinions in regard to procuring seed grain for the farmers of this county who were unable to raise any grain on their land the past season, and are unable to procure any seed for the spring of 1897, have come to the conclusion that several hundred farmers are unable to procure any seed grain without assistance, and the county is unable to procure the necessary seed grain, and, therefore, without some assistance from the state, these farmers will be without seed grain, and consequently a great part of this county's land, which is cultivated and prepared for seed, will lie idle this summer for want of seed, and hardship and great suffering among these farmers will be the consequences.

Therefore we request you to ask the legislature for an appropriation of at least \$15,000 as a loan for seed grain for this county, to be only used for seed grain this spring.

Said loan to be a loan to the county, and giving the authority to the commissioners to regulate the distribution of the same to the needy, and the county to be responsible for the collection of the same.

Further, we most emphatically protest against any law whereby the distribution and collecting would be vested in any appointed parties, as then the expenses would be more than the benefit derived therefrom, and prejudice and favoritism would be the rule rather than the exception.

Hoping you will do the best you can both for the needy and for the county.

Resolved, that the county auditor be authorized to draw a warrant on the county revenue fund to the amount of \$2,000 to be applied on the last installment of the seed grain loan of 1893 due the state. Chap. 225, Law of 1893, Sec's. 3, 4, 5.

The following report of the Board of Auditors was accepted:

Feb. 1st, 1897. Board met pursuant to adjournment, and opened the bid received for additional depository, which was as follows: "Scandia American Bank, Crookston, 3 1/2 per cent interest on daily balances computed monthly."

On motion it was resolved that the bid submitted be accepted, and the Scandia American Bank of Crookston be designated as additional depository to hold funds belonging to Marshall county, Minn., for the next two years. On motion adjourned.

J. Q. Cronkhite and Hon. M. A. Goar.
