




O. P. Bjorklund,

Republican nominee for County Treasurer, was born in Sweden, Jan. 16, 1869. When but a child he came to America with his parents and settled in Wright county, whence they subsequently removed to Marshall county, which has been the home of the subject of this sketch since 1880. Mr. Bjorklund some years ago took a course in bookkeeping at Hope Academy, Moorhead, and is amply qualified to discharge the duties of the Treasurer's office in a business-like and satisfactory manner. Greeley E. Carr,

Candidate of the Republicans for County Attorney, was born in Clin-


ton Co., Iowa, in 1867. The first fifteen years of his life were spent on a farm. He came to Minnesota in the fall of 1888, and resided at Argyle for one year. He then entered the University of Minnesota, graduating from the law department in 1891. Returned to Argyle in the fall of that year and commenced practicing law in co-partnership with L. S. Bayrell. In July, 1892, he moved to Stephen, where he has ever since been engaged in the practice of his profession. Mr. Carr served as assistant County Attorney for several years, and is thoroughly familiar with the duties of the office he seeks at your hands. He canvassed the county for the same office in 1896 and came very near being elected, his energetic campaign materially assisting in reducing the former Populist majorities throughout the county. Frank A. Green,

Candidate for re-election on the Republican ticket, was born on a farm in Erie Co., Pennsylvania, May 21, 1860, and lived there, working on the farm in the summers and attending school and teaching during the winters, until the spring of 1882, when he removed to Marshall county, Minn. For four years he was foreman on the Wheeler & Culbertson farm in Augsburg, in this county, and from 1886 to 1889 was manager of the W. C. Culbertson farm in the same town. In 1889 he moved onto his own farm in Sinnott, where he continued to reside until his election as Sheriff in 1896. Mr. Green is of a genial,

kindly disposition, but has shown himself the possessor of those qualities of firmness and self-reliance so necessary to the proper administration of the office he holds. He was elected Sheriff two years ago by an overwhelming majority, and the manner in which he has performed the duties of his office has been so universally satisfactory that it is extremely improbable that he will be less fortunate at the ensuing election.



P. H. Holm,

Is a candidate for re-election to the office of Probate Judge. He was born in Sweden, where he received a good education in his youth. He came to America in 1883 and for a time lived with his parents on their homestead in Nelson Park. He afterward conducted a jewelry business in Stephen until his election to the office of County Treasurer in 1888. In 1890 he was re-elected by a majority of 200 despite the Populist landslide, being the only Republican candidate who did not go down to defeat that year. This shows his great popularity. In 1896 he was chosen to fill the office to which he now seeks re-election by a large majority, defeating one of the most popular Populists in the county. His administration of the duties of the office has given general satisfaction, and he deserves another term at your hands. As a public servant he has ever been known as faithful, careful, prompt and efficient in the discharge of his official duties.

Thorvald Morck,

Republican candidate for Clerk of Court, was born in Sarpsborg, Norway, Jan. 9th, 1863. He received a common school education and at
