— Carl Alm, a young man 23 years old, well known around here, died last week and was buried on Sunday last in the Swedish Luth. cemetery in Vega. He was a brother of Mrs. Anna Dahlin, of Bloomer, and L. P. Alm, of Big Woods. He was a victim of consumption.

— DIED: Manton Campion, son of Mrs. B. S. Campion, near Angus, died this morning, aged 28 years. He had been a sufferer from consumption during the past two years, and spent last winter at San Antonio, Tex., for the benefit of his health, having come home only about a week ago. He was a young man well known in Warren, and was held in great esteem.

— The St. James Hotel on the east side, also known as the Latimer building, burned down last night. The fire was first noticed by Fred Lundberg, who turned in the alarm at about half past twelve o'clock. A strong southerly wind prevailed at the time and though the fire department responded quickly it was found impossible to save the building, but most of the furniture contained therein was removed. The building was owned by Mrs. H. E. Robbins, and was occupied at the time by the Robbins children, who slept there, and were awakened and gotten out in time. It is fortunate that the wind was in that direction, as there were no buildings near on the north side. With the wind from the north the whole east side would have been in danger. The building was insured for \$1,000 in the agency of Flanders & Wood.
