The army board has recommended that Crookston be made an army post, and the martial spirit is already beginning to assert itself among the Crookstonians.

Senator Grindelund has been appointed a member of the senate committee to pass upon the bills to be considered at this session of the legislature. It is an important committee, and judging by the looks of things it will have no easy task to confine the legislature to the special work for which it was called.

WHATEVER is or is not done in the railway merger case, it can be taken for granted that the people will never surrender their welfare and their rights to the tender mercy of absolute monopoly. If competition cannot be insured, there will be rigid regulation and supervision, even to the extent of fixing rates.

A GREAT drawback to the construction of good roads in the Red River valley is the scarcity of suitable material. Gravel can be found only in certain localities, and our rich, black soil is as adhesive as mud when it gets wet, and not at all suitable as road material. But it is now claimed that burning the clay will entirely change its nature, remove its adhesive qualities, and make it into excellent road material. Railroads in the east are treating clay in this manner for their road beds, and find it as serviceable and as cheap as gravel. We would like to see some experiments made along this line on our streets and roads.

The Minneapolis Journal on Tuesday published a large special edition for land seekers, that was brimful of information concerning the agricultural resources of the great Northwest. According to all signs there will be a much larger influx of settlers from the older states this year than did take place last year, with a corresponding increase in land values and prices. It is estimated that 200,000 new settlers will come to the northwest this year and the beauty of it is that all who come, can be taken care of yet for a while.

We acknowledge receipt of an Atlas of Marshall County gotten up by Editor Mattson, of the WARREN SHEAF, and must say that it is something that every household in the county should possess. It is neatly gotten up and gives the name of every land owner in Marshall county, with a description of the land, also a complete poll list as shown by the tax records. It also contains a map of each township in the county showing the location of different schools throughout the county, and we suggest that every school board in the county should get one for the use of the school. ## Sound Advice From Carnegie.

One night last week Andrew Carnegie spoke at the meeting of the railroad branch of the Young Men's Christian association. In the course of his address he said:

"The best of wealth is not what it does for the owner, but what it enables him to do for others.

"And let me tell you there is nothing in money beyond having a competence, nothing but the satisfaction of being able to help others.

"It is one of the most cheering facts of our day that under present conditions the wages of labor rise and the price of necessities of life fall. There was never a nation so splendidly situated as ours is at this moment in regard to labor. Every sober and capable and willing man finds employment at wages which, with thrift and a good wife to manage, will enable him to go far toward laying up a competence for old age. There is nothing that success and happiness of a workingman so much depends upon as having a good managing wife.

"Let one who has, almost without intention or desire, had himself loaded with more than a competence tell you soberly that what one has beyond this brings little with it, and sometimes nothing desirable with it. What all of you should strive for is a competence, without which, Junius has said, no man can be happy. No man should be happy without it, if it be within reach, and I urge all of you to save a part of your earnings these prosperous days, and put it in savings banks at interest, or, better still, buy a home with it.

"It took me some time to learn, but I did learn that supremely great managers, such as you have these days never do any work to speak of themselves; their point is to make others work while they think. I applied this lesson in after life so that others did the work and I did the laughing and I command to superintendents the thought that there is very little success where there is little laughter. The workman who rejoices in his work and laughs away its discomforts is the man sure to rise."

There are hundreds of men who, having made total failures themselves, are ever ready to advise others how to succeed. But here is a man who has made a decided success in life financially, and his own words may be relied upon as pointing out the way that leads up to the millions, and those who are capable of grasping his meaning and applying the principles in their own business, may, like him, pass beyond the "competence" to which he refers. However, there be many who are not endowed with sufficient business acumen to reach even the desired "competence," and must continue to toil and earn their bread by the "sweat of the brow."
