The fortune left by Cecil Rhodes is estimated at \$30,000,000—not badly done by one who went to South Africa solely for his health. By the terms of his will the bulk of his property will be used to promote the cause of higher education. The United States and also Germany will share in his great educational bequests. Two scholarships at Oxford University from each state and territory in the United States will be appointed by competitive examinations, each to enjoy an annual income of \$1500 for three years.

REV. T. DEWITT TALMAGE, the famous preacher, has passed away. Though he cannot be classed as a great preacher, theologian or thinker, yet he possessed a remarkable power to present great truths in an original and fascinating way, a little sensational perhaps, but nevertheless earnestly and reverently. The large audience who thronged to hear him, and that much larger audience in every part of the world, who were delighted to read his sermons and lectures, and profited thereby, will miss him very much indeed.

The new settlers from Iowa and Southern Minnesota are taking the lead in shutting off on wheat; one of them says he will put in only ten acres, just enough for his own use, the balance of his land will be seeded with grain for feed—we think he is wise. The trouble with most of us is that we can't wait for the slow returns of stock raising, and in the local markets we have to sell stock at 3 or 4 cents per pound, which costs us 4 and 5 cents to raise and fatten, leaving the profit on the wrong side of the ledger.—Glyndon News.

In last week's issue the Hallock News suggests the name of Hon. C. J. McCollom, of Hallock, as the logical candidate for state senator. The time is drawing near when the people of this legislative district will have to seriously consider whom they want as a successor to Mr. Grindeland. Mr. McCollom certainly made a good record as a member of the house, and his elevation to the senate would be in the line of promotion for faithful service. His failure to secure a re-election two years ago can be ascribed more to the carelessness of the voters in marking their ballots, than to any short comings on his part as a votes getter. Kittson county is probably entitled to name the next state senator, that much we believe the other counties of the district will be willing to concede, and if the republicans of said county unite on their man, he

will in all probability receive the nomination. And if they unite on so good, clean and honorable a man as Mr. McCollom, the district has reason to congratulate itself.

It may be "none of our business," but we cannot help watching the contest now going on in the ninth congressional district with more than usual interest, and, we might as well admit it, this interest centers in the probable success of Senator Andrew Grindeland, candidate for congress. Our solicitude for the senators success is perhaps natural as we had splendid opportunities during the past three sessions of the state senate to observe his legislative career. No man in the senate watched over the interest of his constituents more jealously than did Mr. Grindeland. Very rarely indeed was his seat vacant and his vote was always right. While he laid no pretensions to oratory he possessed a rare gift of analyzing the probable effect of proposed legislation and this with his studious habits and close attention to business made him at all times a most valuable and influential member. He possessed in the highest degree the confidence of his co-workers and the qualities which made him strong in the state senate will serve a like purpose should he be elevated to a seat in the national congress. The voters of the ninth district will make no mistake when they elect Senator Grindeland, as we confidently believe that they will.—Editor S. A. Langum in the Preston, Filmore Co., Times.
