THE LEGISLATIVE SITUATION.

By reason of fair play, and give and take in politics, Kittson county is entitled to the senatorship for the coming term in this legislative district. Marshall county has had the senatorship during the past four years when the office has been so ably filled, and acceptably to the people, by Senator Grindeland, as well as during two former terms when the office was filled by populist incumbents. It devolved upon Kittson county to present her candidate. Two good Kittson county men were aspirants for the position, Mr. B. E. Sundberg, of Kennedy and Mr. Peter Lofgren, of Pelan. By reason of his very much longer residence in the county and faithful and disinterested party service in many former campaigns, as well as other qualifications, the Republican county convention of Kittson county held on Tuesday, endorsed the candidacy of Mr. B. E. Sundberg, for state senator. Mr. Lofgren consequently will not make the race at the primary election, and like a good, loyal Republican will not sulk in his tent, but will, we think "whoop'er up" for his successful rival as enthusiastically as he would have done for himself. That is the spirit of true Republicanism. Mr. Lofgren is not yet an old man, and in the years to come the party will have plenty of opportunity to honor him, if he so desires. Mr. Sundberg, who is the choice of the Republicans of Kittson county for state senator is in every sense well worthy of the place. As a farmer and business man he stands high in the community where he lives. He will make a good senator and is entitled to receive the hearty and united support of the people in the whole legislative district as well as at the polls in November.

Marshall and Roseau counties are each entitled to select one representative. As far as we know, no avowed candidate for the office has come forward in Marshall county. The names of several gentlemen have been suggested, however, and among them have been those of H. O. Hanson and B. B. Brett, of Stephen, and H. L. Melgaard, and C. T. Ohmer, of Argyle. The primary election is drawing near, and it will not do to

leave the position vacant. Israel Sjoberg, of Roseau county, will probably be a candidate from said county.

GRASSHOPPERS.

Important Suggestions to Farmers.
Young hoppers are now quite generally present in last year's stubble. Carefully examine all such unploughed land, and if hoppers are numerous and still quite small, say for the most part not more than 1/2 inch long, or if eggs are present in the land, you may save yourself and your neighbors several hundred dollars by immediate ploughing. This to be of any use should be done at once, beginning at edge of field and working toward center; by doing this thousands of young hoppers will be killed. It should have been done last fall or not later than May 20th in spring. If hoppers are larger, that is if they can jump out of the way of the plough, use hopper-dosers and kerosene, preferably when the day is bright and warm, they can be well used also on roadsides and in pastures where ploughing is not practicable. Consult your county commissioner. He is authorized to grant kerosene in limited amount to those owning hopper-dosers. These may be made at a cost of about \$4.00 complete. Ploughing is most effective when the weather is cold or wet, at which time the young hoppers hug the ground.

After Long and Successful Reign the Saxon Monarch Succumbs to Cancer.

Dresden, Saxony, June 20.—After a successful reign of nearly three decades, beloved by all his subjects, King Albert of Saxony died at eight p. m. Thursday. All the royal relatives and prominent members of the court were at the bedside of the monarch during his dying moments.

He was conscious almost to the last and immediately before his demise he designated his eldest brother, Prince George, to succeed him on the throne. This act of the decedent was a surprise to all, as it was commonly believed that he would be succeeded by his nephew, Prince Frederick, the oldest son of Prince George. For two years the king was a sufferer from cancer and many times his life hung by a thread, from which his vigorous constitution aided him to rally.

HONORED IN BRONZE.

Statue of Late Richard P. Bland is Unveiled at Lebanon, Mo.

Lebanon, Mo., June 18.—A statue erected to the memory of Richard Parks Bland, who served in congress almost continuously from 1872 until 1899, was unveiled here Tuesday with impressive ceremonies. An immense crowd gathered to hear addresses by William J. Bryan, William J. Stone and others. The statue is of bronze, life size and rests on a pedestal of stone six feet.

Auditor's Notice of Hearing on Petition.

Whereas, The petition of J. K. Wood and others, bearing date the 9th day of June, 1902, and on file in my office, praying for the establishment of a public ditch along the route proposed therein, has been filed in my office; Now, therefore, I hereby give notice of the pendency of said petition, and that the same will be heard and determined before the said Board of County Commissioners, at their next regular session to be held at the City of Warren in said county, on the 7th day of July, 1902, at 1 o'clock p. m. True copy of said petition is as follows, to-wit:

TO THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF MARSHALL STATE OF MINNESOTA:
The undersigned land owners, whose lands will be liable to be affected by, or assessed for, the expense of the construction of the ditch hereinafter described, would respectfully represent that the public health, convenience and welfare require the establishment and construction of a ditch along the following described route in the town of McGraw, in said County of Marshall, and that the construction of the same would be of public benefit and utility.

A general description of the proposed starting point, route and terminus of said ditch is as follows:
Commencing at southeast corner of the northeast quarter section two (2), township 154, north range 47 west, running thence west one mile to the quarter section corner between sections two (2) and three (3) of said township, thence running north one half mile to the northeast corner of section three (3) of said township, thence running along the following route: thence west on the township line between section three (3) in township 154, range 47, and section thirty-four (34) in township 155, range 47, and section four (4), township 154, and section thirty-three (33), township 155, range 47, thence north about one hundred rods through the southeast quarter of section thirty-three (33), township 155, range 47, to the head of the ravine, and terminating at said ravine as its outlet.

And your petitioners pray that you will proceed to establish said ditch and cause the same to be constructed as provided by Chapter Two Hundred and Fifty-eight (258) of the General Laws of Minnesota for 1901, and subsequent amendments thereto.




