NEW RAILROAD FOR MARSHALL CO.

The Great Northern Has a Line Projected North from East Grand Forks.

The new maps issued by the Great Northern railway company show a new line extending from East Grand Forks in a northerly direction, crossing the Soo between Alvarado and Oslo, and then northward following the Red River more or less closely to a point almost due west from Stephen. There the road ends on the map, but it is hinted that from that point it may be continued in a northeasterly direction to Lake of the Woods. That there is something in this new railroad scheme is more than probable, as the company would not be likely to place a line on the map unless it intended to construct it at no distant day. Well, let it come. Next summer we may see some more railroad building in Marshall county.

School Report.

Report of school, Dist. No. 19, town of Vega, for December. The district has lately installed the Rannum heating and ventilation plant, procured text books, dictionaries and globes for its two schools, and also purchased a library of about eighty volumes, which together with other improvements will entitle the district to special state aid. A little village has begun to spring up, and among other business enterprises established is also a bank, the Bank of Viking, which a short time ago opened for business in its own handsome brick building, and which is officered by the following well known gentlemen and capitalists: O. H. Taralseth, of Warren, president; H. L. Melgaard of Argyle, vice-president; and I. M. Myrbo, cashier. The new institution will furnish banking facilities to a large number of people in that section.

HELD ON MURDER CHARGE.

State Senator Farnum, of Chicago, Arrested for Complicity in Killing of Kopf.

Chicago, Dec. 27.—State Senator Frank C. Farnum, representing the Nineteenth district in the upper house of the Illinois general assembly, was arrested Tuesday afternoon and locked all night in a cell in the Warren avenue police station, Wednesday, he was released under \$20,000 bonds. The charge brought against Farnum by the city police is that of being accessory before the fact to the fatal stabbing of County Commissioner John V. Kopf eight days ago. George Roberts, a clerk at the republican ward election in the Thirteenth ward, is held for the actual stabbing, which resulted in the commissioner's sudden death on Sunday. The arrest of Senator Farnum followed a complete confession made by Thomas Wood, a negro follower of the Deneen leader. Wood was placed in the sweatbox Tuesday afternoon. Before he left it he had told a story which implicated Senator Farnum in a plot to steal the ballot box used at the Thirteenth ward club election. It was the attempt to carry out this plot which caused the death of Kopf.

THE KIND OF CATTLE TO RAISE.

Younger Stuff now Wanted at the Markets.—The 2000 lb Steer out of Style.

Not many years ago the ponderous steer grown on the western prairie was the best selling beef animal in the world; he was wanted by exporters, by butchers, by cattle connoisseurs and by gourminds. To be in prime condition he must be four years old and weigh from 1,600 to 2,000 lbs. Many fine bunches of such steers have been marketed and exhibited at fat stock shows and then sent across the seas to grace the table of my lord, mein herr and monsieur le duc. But times, conditions and cattle change, and the once highly rated big steer is no longer profitable, says the Agricultural Epitomist.

To be highly praised and prized the animal should be two years old or under, should weigh 1,000 pounds, must be fed for market from the day he was calved and should be a Polled Angus or a Hereford (as they dress more) to please the buyer. The more blood he has in him of these now fashionable breeds and the sooner after birth he is in condition to put on the market the better for profits of the feeder—the profits of the breeder on this steer is greater than the old style four years old. The two year old matures sooner, gets fat quicker, and the better his blood the quicker he fattens, and while he weighs about thirty per cent less than his predecessor, his cost per pound is much less also. The breeder has the expense of his feed and care for only half the time he had his predecessor, one item in cost of raising which more than compensates for his lesser weight. It is the breeder's making that the quicker an animal can be put in condition for the block the greater the proportionate profits; good breeding, careful feeding and early maturity are very essential to success in cattle breeding. It is well for the farmer and raiser of stock to remember that competition is sharper and prices lower and that economy in those items of greatest cost, food and time, should be considered in meeting the demands of the market.

A steer can be fed to a weight of 1,000 pounds cheaper than one can be fed to a weight of 2,000 pounds, and while the immediate profit is smaller it will come quicker. Again, the profits on two well bred two year olds is larger than on one of the old style 4-year-olds. This argument presupposes that the farmer has a good animal to start on—scrubs pay poorly at best, and often do not pay at all, to say nothing of those which are a clear loss. The price of the coarse grains and feed stuff is low, but to feed it to a poor animal is almost like putting salt into a sieve while to feed it to one of good blood is to use your five talents to make five other talents. Besides these considerations the farmer will have had the additional great advantage of a supply of manure which will bring very tangible profits in increasing crops.
