

PARIS REVOLT IS A FIZZLE

BAD ELEMENT HELD IN CHECK BY MILITIA

Troops Bide Over Anarchists and Revolutionists Who Join in May Day Disorders.

Paris, May 2.—The long-dreaded May day failed to bring the revolution which inflammatory journals predicted, but it brought scenes of extreme violence. The labor districts, which thousands of troops controlled with difficulty and even central portions of Paris have taken on the appearance of a siege, with regiments of infantry and cavalry camped about the Arc de Triomphe, the bourse, the Bank of France and the great railway station, while military sentinels paced before banks and private establishments.

The main thoroughfares in the residential portion of Paris remain tranquil. In the West end, far removed from riotous scenes people were disposed to treat the events in the labor quarters as harmless effervescence. It was, however, much more than that. Throughout the afternoon dragoons, republican guards and cuirassiers charged disorderly masses, sweeping the Place de la Republique and the broad Boulevard de Magenta. Toward nightfall cavalry charged with drawn swords, and many persons were wounded on both sides. The manifestants overturned omnibuses and threw up hasty barricades. Over 1,000 arrests were made during the day.

FISHING LAWS ARE DRASTIC

Bill Before Newfoundland Legislature Forbids Natives Working on Foreign Vessels.

St. Johns N. F., May 4.—The new foreign fishing vessels' bill was introduced in the legislature Thursday by Premier Bond. It re-enacts last year's measure with several additional clauses. The first forbids any alien not so entitled by treaty to fish in colonial waters, and any vessel having such fishermen aboard is liable to a fine of \$100 or forfeiture of the vessel. The second forbids any colonist to fish outside or for any foreign fishing vessel in colonial waters. The third additional clause forbids any colonist to leave the colony for the purpose of joining any foreign fishing vessel. The fourth forbids any colonist to lend, hire or sell any fishing gear to any foreign vessel, or such vessel to borrow, hire or buy such gear. The fifth fines any craft \$100 which conveys colonists outside colonial waters to join foreign fishing vessels. The sixth holds all foreign vessels existing treaty rights in colonial waters amendable to all colonial laws not inconsistent with treaty rights. These new sections greatly increase the stringency of the statute and make it impossible for Americans to hire colonists to engage in the west coast herring fishery as practiced last winter.

ZULUS KILL BRITISH JUDGE

Native Ambush Party and Serious Consequences May Result—Another Tribe in Revolt.

Pietermaritzburg, Natal, May 5.—An outrage which may have serious consequences has occurred in Zululand. Mr. Stainbank, the British magistrate at Mahlabitini, Zululand, has been killed by Zulus while collecting taxes near that place. Mr. Stainbank, his wife, a woman companion and some mounted police were caught in an ambush by hostile natives, who fired a volley at them. The magistrate and one of the policemen were fatally wounded. Mr. Stainbank and the two ladies managed to reach Mahlabitini, where the magistrate died of his wounds. Mahlabitini lies to the westward of the forest where Bambata, the insurgent chief, formerly the regent of the Greytown district, Natal, who had been in arms against the local authorities for a month past, had been hiding, and it is asserted here that there seems to be no doubt that the rebel chief has succeeded in inducing another tribe of Zulus to join in the revolt.

Department Store Burned.

Meridian, Miss., May 3.—Fire destroyed the building and stock of the Winner-Klein company, wholesale and retail department stores, early Wednesday, causing a loss of more than \$100,000. The loss is practically covered by insurance. The prevalence of high winds threatened a general conflagration, but the firemen prevailed. The fire originated in a frame candy shop in the rear of the burned building.

Police Stop Socialist Parade.

Newark, N. J., May 3.—Policemen broke up a socialist parade here and arrested two of the leaders because a red flag was planted in the van. Chief of Police Adams had received word that the socialists intended to use the red flag and directed them not to do so. They denied they intended to exploit anarchy and maintained that the anarchist flag was black and white.

Southern Methodists Meet.

Birmingham, Ala., May 4.—The Fifteenth quadriennial meeting of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, began here Thursday with about 200 delegates and 300 visitors, church officers and others present. The roll-call revealed the presence of nine active bishops.

Kills Man for Pint of Beer.

Fort Dodge, Ia., May 2.—During a quarrel over the price of a pint of beer Al Freht, a bartender, struck Will Church a terrific blow on the jaw, killing him instantly.

A Foul Murder.

The coroner's inquest held on the body of the man found dead in the field of Ole Berkhole, southwest of Wannaska Monday of last week, disclosed that the dead man's name was John Stuart, and that he had in all likelihood been murdered by a young man named McKenzie, who it seems, had been with Stuart for some time, and who came to Roseau county with him. Stuart, who it appears, was a horsedealer, had been stopping for some time with W. Stevneson, about fifteen miles from Wannaska. On Dec. 30, Stuart went to the post office at Wannaska, and there got a registered letter from Harlan, Mont., containing a considerable sum of money. Stuart opened the letter in the store at Wannaska, and several persons present saw that it contained quite a large sum. He returned that afternoon to Stevneson's and during the evening told McKenzie in the presence of Stevneson, that he would have to go to work, as he was not going to keep him up any longer, and that he intended to leave Roseau county next day. Stuart said he was expecting money from his brother, and that when it came he was going away too.

On the morning of Dec. 31, Stuart set out afoot for Roseau, and McKenzie borrowed a shot gun from Stevneson, and said he would go to Wannaska and see if his letter had come. Both men left Stevneson's at one time, but taking different roads. That evening McKenzie returned to Stevneson's, and said he had got his letter. Asked if he had shot anything, he said he had shot a chicken, but that it was too poor to carry home. He was restless all night, and left in the morning before daylight, without breakfast, going directly to Roseau. At Roseau, he displayed quite a roll of money, and spent lavishly all New Year's Day, and left in the middle of the night, nobody knowing which way he went.

The inquest discloses that he had not been at the postoffice at Wannaska the day Stuart left Stevneson's for Roseau, nor subsequently, and that he had gotten no letter from that office. The shot and wads taken from the wounds in Stewart's head are identical with those with which the gun was loaded that McKenzie borrowed from Stevneson the morning of Dec. 31, 1905; and the inference comes naturally, that McKenzie, instead of going to the postoffice, made a detour and came out to the road which he knew Stuart would travel to reach Roseau, and there lay in wait for him, and killed him for the money. The wound was that of a shot gun, and the lower jaw was carried almost completely away. The body had been carried off the road about a hundred feet, and a few branches thrown over it.

McKenzie was known in Roseau county as Billy Smith, but Stuart said he had known him from a boy, and that his real name was McKenzie.—Warroad Plaindealer.

School of Traction Engineering.

A school for turning out traction engineers will be held at Minneapolis State Fair Grounds commencing June 4, 1906 and closing June 30. Young men who want to learn how to run threshing engines next fall ought to avail themselves of the opportunity furnished by this school. That there is great need for such training is made evident by the large number of boilers that have been exploded, the number of engines that have been wrecked, and the great losses in operation that have been sustained largely through the ignorance and carelessness of poorly trained engineers. Many a fine engine sent out has met with failure just because the men who purchased it operated it knew nothing of the principles or were lacking in the necessary skill to make it do the work it was intended to do.

The instruction will be thorough and practical, and those who take the course and receive the diploma after examination, will get an engineer's second class license. If the length of service warrants it first class and chief engineer's licenses will be issued. The licenses will be issued by the Secretary of the Board of State Boiler Inspectors and are accepted in most states as evidence of qualification to operate steam boilers and steam engines. As a good engineer generally commands big wages, the school ought to be well patronized. Address all letters of inquiry to

Commissioners' Proceedings.

Special Ditch Meeting, Ditch No. 11.

Special meeting of Board of County Commissioners held at the county auditor's office, city of Warren, Minn., April 27th, 1906.

Meeting called to order by the chairman at 2 p. m. Members present, Jens P. Jensen, chairman; J. S. Hilleboe, E. O. Bystrom and Herman Engelsrud. On motion, resolved that the amended report of the viewers on ditch No. 11 be accepted and that said ditch be established as prayed for in the petition and as recommended by the engineer and viewers, and the following order establishing said ditch was duly passed by a unanimous vote of the board.

ORDER ESTABLISHING DITCH.

State of Minnesota, County of Marshall, ss. In the matter of the petition of H. H. Hulbert, and others, for a public ditch in the County of Marshall, State of Minnesota. The above entitled matter came duly to be heard by and before the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Marshall, State of Minnesota, at a special meeting of said board, duly called for the purpose of hearing and considering the petition for said ditch in the above entitled matter, on the 27th day of April, A. D. 1906, at 2 o'clock p. m. of said day; and it appearing by proper evidence that due notice had been given the petitioner and the board of county commissioners, and that the petition and said time of hearing thereon, and the O. L. Hamery, the civil engineer appointed by this board to survey the route of said ditch, has completed his work and filed his report thereon in the office of the county auditor of said county, and that the viewers appointed by the board to view and report on said work, have duly completed their labors and made and filed their report in due form of law in the office of said county auditor, and that the County Commissioners did, at the time above specified, proceed to hear said petition and said viewers' report thereon; and the board having duly considered said petition and heard all the parties interested for or against the construction of said ditch, and all matters pertaining thereto, find as follows, to-wit:

First: That the said civil engineer has completed his work and filed his report thereon in all respects according to law.

Second: That the said viewers appointed herein have duly completed their labors and have made and filed their report thereon according to law.

Third: That the estimated benefits to be derived from the construction of said work are greater than its total cost, including damages awarded.

Fourth: That the damages and benefits arising from the construction of said ditch have been duly awarded and assessed, and that the same are just and equitable, and said viewers are complete and correct.

Fifth: That notice of this hearing of said petition and of said viewers' report, and said engineer's report has been duly given, published and posted and mailed as by law required, and that proofs of said service of notice have been made and filed in the office of the county auditor of said county.

Now, therefore, as conclusions from the foregoing findings, we, the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Marshall, State of Minnesota, at said special session of said board, held at the time and place above being satisfied that the proposed ditch will be of public utility and conducive to public health and public benefit and convenience, and that the same is necessary for the reasons stated in the petition therefor, do hereby locate and establish the said ditch according to the report and the specifications of said civil engineer made and filed herein; and do hereby establish and confirm the report of the viewers and file the same.

It is further ordered, that the damages awarded to the persons and corporations named in the viewers' report herein, in excess of the amount paid out of the county treasury of said county on warrants to be drawn and attested by the auditor of said county and signed by the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners; and that said warrant be issued at the expiration of the time for appeal from this order in favor of the persons and corporations named therein have appealed, and shall be dated and become due and payable immediately after the expiration of the time for appeal from this order of the ditch herein referred to; and that in case of appeal from this order, or in case of any postponement or delay in determining the amount of damages due to any persons or corporations, the warrant in favor of such persons or corporations shall not be issued until the same has been fully given. Special Ditch Meeting, Ditch No. 14.

Special meeting of Board of County Commissioners held at the county auditor's office, city of Warren, Minn., April 27th, 1906.

Meeting called to order by the chairman at 9:30 a. m. Members present, Jens P. Jensen, chairman; J. S. Hilleboe, E. O. Bystrom and Herman Engelsrud.

Pursuant to notice the petition of H. H. Hulbert and thirteen others, for a public drainage ditch in the towns of Sinnott and Donnelly came up for a hearing, and there being no opposition and no one appearing against said petition it was upon motion duly granted and the following order, appointing an engineer and three viewers, was duly made and filed:

IN THE MATTER OF PETITION OF H. H. HULBERT AND OTHERS FOR A PUBLIC DRAINAGE DITCH IN THE COUNTY OF MARSHALL AND STATE OF MINNESOTA, THE SAME BEING COUNTY DITCH NO. 14.

State of Minnesota, County of Marshall, ss. Whereas, a petition bearing date the 22nd day of March, A. D. 1906, signed by H. H. Hulbert and thirteen (13) other land owners whose lands would be affected by or assessed for the expense of constructing the same, praying for the establishment of a certain public drainage ditch in said county, the route of which is more fully described in said petition, and a proper non-accompanying the same has been filed with the county auditor of said county, as by law required, and the said board of county commissioners have been approved by the said county auditor as required by law; and whereas, it appeared by satisfactory proof filed with the county auditor of said county, that the Board of County Commissioners of said Marshall county that due notice of the pendency of said petition and the time and place at which the same would be heard has been given as required by law;

Brown, of Stephen, Minn., Lewis Westman, of Warren, Minn., and Thor Jorgenson, of Artyle, Minn., three resident freeholders of said Marshall county not interested in the construction of the proposed work and not of kin to any of the parties known to be interested therein, be and they are hereby appointed as viewers to meet at a time and place to be specified by the county auditor of said county preparatory to commencing their duties as such viewers and after the completion of their duties as such viewers to make and file their report with the county auditor of said county.

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
