It was a Johnson land slide sure. He carried all but six counties in the State.

Though Cole did not win, his idea of state development will go marching on.

Fillmore county went democratic for the first time in its history, giving Johnson a majority of 90 votes.

A precinct named 'Green Isle' cast every one of its 69 votes for John A. Johnson. The governor will always keep that isle green in his memory.

From Texas comes the first mention of Johnson for president. When such mentions begin to come from New York state the governor will sit up and take notice.

The election of a democratic governor and a democratic judge in North Dakota was a rebuke to the political machine which for years has dominated that state.

The people of McHenry county, N. D., elected a dead man for justice. He died on the eve of election, but his name was on the ballot, and the news of his death did not reach the voters.

E. A. Nelson, of Hallock, is a candidate for secretary of the senate, the position that Sam Langum has held for many years. Both aspirants are lining up the senators the best they know how.

Our state map needs constant revision. Two new counties were created at the recent election—Mahonmen, from eastern Norman county, and Koochiching, from northern Itasca county.

The Minnesota University Football team defeated the Chicago University team on the latter's field last Saturday by a score of 4 to 2. The Chicago institution would have given many barrels of Rockefeller oil to have won.

Peary, who has succeeded in planting the American flag farther north than that of any other nation, only 203 miles from the pole, says that next summer he will make another dash for the coveted goal, and hopes then to reach it.

Those four negro companies who created a disturbance down in Texas, where they were stationed, have been disbanded by order of the president. No rowdiness can be tolerated in the army, even in the colored portion of it, that is Roosevelt's dictum.

In Roseau county a boy has been shot by mistake for a wolf, and a Kelsey, Minn. farmer has moved his family to Duluth, as he considered it unsafe for his children to stroll in the woods during the hunting season. A hunter who shoots a person by mistake for game is a criminal and should be treated as such.

Forsberg and Tell ran a close race for sheriff. The early returns favored Mr. Tell and all indications pointed to his election. Everybody said that Tell was surely elected until Mr. Tell began to feel that way himself, and Mr. Forsberg also thought that he himself was the doomed man, and had commenced to philosophize over his defeat. But when all the returns came in Mr. Forsberg was found to be just four votes ahead of his opponent. Thus both candidates had the feelings that come from both victory and defeat, though in Mr. Forsberg's case the joy of victory is the more lasting.

The defeat of McCleary in the second district is a great loss to the state and the nation, notwithstanding his high tariff views. He had reached a prominence in national affairs that few men in congress attain, and reflected credit on the state that sent him there. On every other question than the tariff his judgment was never questioned by his constituents. Even on the tariff no one doubts his sincerity, and besides he had the courage of his convictions. He was always ready to give reasons, which to him looked potent, for the faith that was in him. Mr. McCleary is no demagogue, but an honest, outspoken and sincere man. The voters could well have afforded to have over-looked his tariff views for his eminent services in other respects. His defeat, however, is a warning to the party in power to revise the tariff, or that work will be undertaken by the democratic party; and we remember the disastrous results of its former tinkering with the question.

Secretary Bonaparte has taken a step backward in statesmanship by advocating the turning over the choosing of public officers to political bosses. According to his idea the people should elect each year a "legislated party boss" in each election district. The duty of the "county boss" would be to appoint the county official, the "state boss" the state officials, and so on. Mr. Bonaparte must have acquired his ideas of government from his name-sake, the great Napoleon Bonaparte, the greatest political boss the world has ever seen, and who parcelled out crowns

and Kingdoms among his relatives and associates in utter disregard of the wishes of the people. No. what this country needs more than anything else is an intelligent, wide-awake citizenship, who will take an active interest in public affairs, and then there will be no need of party bosses. Leaders, to be sure, there must be, but these must take their cue from the people and embody in themselves the wishes and aspirations of the people. In this country the people are the real bosses.
