STATE HAS DAIRY POSSIBILITIES

Grand Forks, October 22—Enroute through Grand Forks to Grafton, R. C. Jackson, a representative of the federal dairy division, called the attention of the Development Press Bureau to North Dakota's possibilities in dairy development. Mr. Jackson has charge of the silo construction in Walsh and Pembina counties, and has been assisting in dairy development.

"Winnipeg is paying 10 cents a quart for milk, and the duty on it," said Mr. Jackson. "What a bonanza North Dakota farmers, especially those in the northern end of the valley, are overlooking in this matter! They could ship thousands of gallons of milk daily to Winnipeg. Instead they are sending only a few occasional cans to Minneapolis.

"The same old fight by the centralizers against the creameries is being carried on in North Dakota that has been or is being waged in other states. As soon as the creameries are killed off, the price paid by the centralizers is quickly reduced.

"North Dakota," Mr. Jackson concluded, "has wonderful possibilities in a dairying way, if they are developed. I find many people interested in silos, and this appears to me to be the solution of the dairying business in this state. Silos can be constructed cheaply and they certainly answer the purpose."

INDUSTRIAL ART EXHIBIT

Maurice L. Flagg, Director, Old Capitol, St. Paul

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 15—The Minnesota State Art Society, a department of the state government sent an exhibit of Minnesota industrial art to the little town of Wayzata, on Lake Minnetonka, on Wednesday of last week for display with an exhibit of the work of weavers and wood carvers who live in and near Wayzata. The "show" was arranged by the women's club of the town, of which Mrs. W. T. Coe is president.

There are many expert craftsmen in the neighborhood but they have not done much with their valuable art because they have not been encouraged, have not co-operated with one another,

and have not known where or how to market their products, and it was with a view to helping them in all of these lines that the state society joined with the local woman's club.

The exhibits besides those collected in Wayzata, included lace made by the famous lace makers at New Ulm and Sleepy Eye, weaving from looms in Faribault, and various articles of handwork made in the Twin Cities, the object being to illustrate to the Wayzata craftsmen what they might do with profit to themselves. The director of the state society, Maurice L. Flagg, was present to explain the work and gave an illustrated lecture on "Art in simple home furnishings."

After the Wayzata exhibition the Art Society's collection was shipped back to St. Paul to be prepared to send out to many cities and towns in Minnesota. Mr. Flagg announces that the routes on which these "circulating" exhibits will be sent have not been entirely completed, and that other cities and towns may have them if they make arrangements for it with him.

The object of the exhibitions and lectures is, primarily, to illustrate how closely art is related to the common things of life, and many persons in towns where they have been shown said that besides being very entertaining and drawing large crowds, they have been veritable "eye-openers" to the people. The head office of the State Art Society is in the Old Capitol, St. Paul, and all communications should be addressed to the director there.

KEEP THE TOWN LOOKING RIGHT

There are a few people that are not willing to admit there is considerable truth in the old saying that "clothes make the man." And yet in most towns the "clothing" of the town is sadly neglected. "The looks" of a town or city is of vital importance to its growth and welfare. The outward appearance of the town at once labels it as progressive or unprogressive to the visitor. If its buildings are unpainted and in poor repair, if its public buildings are shabby, with poorly kept grounds and no provision for future beautification by the planting of trees, the conclusion inevitably fol-

lows that the town is inhabited by "dead ones."

The ambition of a community to develop depends on the individual viewpoint of its citizens so the appearance of a town depends largely upon the efforts of its individual citizens. Every city or town, however, has its public buildings, and these should be kept in such a manner as to furnish an object lesson. Particularly is this true of the school building in which children get their formative ideas of things in general. The school above all other things should look well and the grounds surrounding it should be planned and cared for with some sense of the artistic.
