**Land Mortgage Association Act About Ready for Enforcement**

Madison, Wis., Dec. 4.—More ready money on easier terms for the farmer an dsettle in Wisconsin will soon be a real possibility. With this end in view the 1913 legislature passed the so-called land mortgage association act. This act is designed to provide money for the land owner for long periods of time at reasonable rates of interest and with the installment payment or amortization privilege.

Since the legislature adjourned the state board of public affairs and the commissioner of banking have been working together on a constitution and by-laws to be adopted by associations to be formed under the act.
