Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the County Auditor of Marshall and Beltrami counties at the office of the County Auditor of Marshall Co., Warren, Minn., in the Court House, on or before 11 o'clock A. M. on the 16th day of January, 1914, for two combination steel and wooden bridges over the main ditch of Judicial Ditch No. 11, Marshall and Beltrami counties; one bridge to be 40 feet long and located at the NE corner of section 24, Twp. 156, Range 40, and one bridge to be 60 feet long and located at the NE corner of section 19, Twp. 156, Range 41, and for any other bridgework that will be required on said system or that may be ordered by the Engineer in charge.

All bids must specify the price per lineal foot of bridge in place; also a price for extra piling per foot, extra lumber per thousand, and the grading per cubic yard.
