FIBRE PLANT BRINGS STATE PUBLICITY

North Dakota is getting considerable publicity because of the Northwestern Paper and Fibre Company which is operating at Grand Forks. Many metropolitan papers and magazines have used articles upon the new plant and process. A sample of this matter is the following from the Investment News published at Chicago:

"North Dakota has added another to its list of industries—paper manufacturing from North Dakota fibre. Samples from the first ton of paper manufactured from North Dakota flax straw have been received in Grand Forks. The paper is comparable to that usually made up from linen and is suitable for correspondence, bonds, etc. The fibre from which the paper was manufactured was made by the Northwestern Paper and Fibre Company. The company has ordered additional machinery so as to care for anticipated demands for paper making purposes. The use of flax fibre is of great importance to the paper making industry, as it shortens the process to a considerable extent and it is the general opinion that the importance of the new industry to N. Dakota can hardly be overestimated. North Dakota bids fair to give the country a substitute for its present raw material for fine paper making."



One Cent Rate for North Dakota.

The opening of North Dakota to homeseekers and unprecedented immigration to the state is indicated by announcement that the Soo Line will establish a one-cent per mile rate for settlers on or about May 1st. That the Interstate Commerce Commission has approved the plan and that it will be put in operation as soon as practicable is the authenticated report received by the North Dakota Development League Press Bureau at Grand Forks. That the stand of the Soo Line will result in the other railroads entering the state adopting a similar plan is the expressed opinion of prominent men in touch with the railroad situation.

The putting into force of homeseekers reduced rates will without question result in hundreds of new settlers for all parts of North Dakota. Already inquiries from interested parties are being received and the early indications are that this spring will see a remarkable increase in passenger traffic into the state. The Soo Line was able to secure these rates only after a long fight before the Interstate Commerce Commission in which they met with much opposition. The result is heralded by those interested in the development of the state as a most important progressive step toward a greater North Dakota.

A SLAVE OF DRUDGERY
