Late Planted Corn for Ensilage and Fodder.

During the past month a great deal of rain has fallen in Minnesota and in some sections corn fields on the level land have been drowned out. Silos have been erected and corn is needed to fill them. Corn may be grown successfully for silage and fodder even though it cannot be planted before July 15th. Warm weather with plenty of sunshine and freedom from rains will cause the corn to grow rapidly, especially in the north where the days are long.

In sections where the land has been prepared and corn planted but drowned out, it may be best to re-plant the land when it has dried out sufficiently. On land that is not weedy, thorough preparation with a disc will be sufficient. The corn can be drilled in with an ordinary corn planter, using 20 to 30 pounds per acre and planting it in rows 42 inches apart. Good seed should be used and thorough cultivation should be given the land as soon as the corn appears. It is surprising how rapidly corn will grow under such conditions. Corn may be planted after July 15th where there is plenty of moisture in the ground. Corn planted so late, however, will not make the best of ensilage, but is much better than no ensilage. Such corn cured in the shock will make excellent fodder. Prompt action as soon as the weather settles is important if a good supply of succulent winter feed is desired.—Andrew Boss, Chief of Agronomy Div. University Farm, St. Paul.
