The whooping cough is still going the rounds. The Swanberg children have had it very severely of late.



**Plating Aluminium.**

A French metallurgist has solved the problem of giving aluminium a coating that will take a high polish and will safeguard it against the effects of the air and of certain foods. By successive baths of boiling lye, cyanide of potassium and hydrochloric acid containing ferrous chloride he produces a surface that takes a plating of nickel so perfectly that the metal can be rolled into plates, drawn into wires or hammered into any shape without in any way injuring the film of nickel.—New York World

**ROUND THE WORLD**

Moscow's Imperial Opera House recently sustained a loss of approximately \$250,000 when the beautifully painted settings for operas and ballets, amounting to nearly 180 pieces of decorative art, were destroyed by fire.

In the twenty-five years from 1887 to 1911 the number of human beings killed by snakes in India was 543,991, or an average of 21,700 annually, according to official reports. During the same time snakes caused the death of 187,436 cattle.

Recently in London at a book sale the sum of \$2,100 was paid for a very rare first edition of a pseudo-Shakespearean play, "The Raigne of King Edward the Third." The play is supposed to have been written by Christopher Marlowe, assisted by Shakespeare.

One of the newest and perhaps odder uses for aluminium is its employment in making the soles of shoes to be used by workmen employed in wet and damp places. The aluminium soled shoe lasts much longer than an ordinary shoe and is said to be impervious to damp.

The jinrikisha, or man drawn vehicle, so universal in the far east, is being rapidly superseded by a "cycle ricksha," which was first put on the market in Shanghai. It is a basket chair cycle combination, propelled by a coolie riding behind and completely shielded from the passenger.

American wire wheels with rubber tires are beginning to compete seriously with Japanese wooden wheels for use on the better class of rickshas in Ceylon.
