

In Minnesota.

Important Happenings of the Week Briefly Told.

Karlstad.—Joseph Eislerich, a Kittson county farmer, died from pneumonia at the age of 50 years. He made a fortune farming.

Moorhead.—Mrs. Julia P. Flaten is in a serious condition as the result of accidentally swallowing a quantity of bedbug poison which was largely composed of bichloride of mercury.

Red Wing.—Mayor A. S. Erb of Faribault and ten other city officials motored to Red Wing to investigate municipal improvements. Faribault plans to electrify its water supply station and wants to profit by Red Wing's modern pumping stations. Mayor Erb and party were entertained by Mayor A. P. Pierce and other officials.

Stillwater.—The city council has approved the report of the city equalization board. The reduction in personal property this year is \$142,000. The total valuation of personal property, money and credits with increase in real estate improvements, amounts to \$2,313,526. The money and credits amount to \$1,391.88 of that sum.

Pipestone.—Mr. and Mrs. William Eikmeier celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. They were married in Westphalen, Germany, in 1865, and the day following their wedding started for America. They first settled on a farm in Dane county, Wis., but removed to Pipestone county in 1882 and have since been residents here.

St. Cloud.—That the school board will not be unable to get a superintendent because of the rapid approach of the opening of the school year was apparent when half a dozen applications from men with splendid qualifications were received. Supt. C. H. Barnes will accept the state position to which he was appointed by August 31st.

Winona.—James A. Tawney, who is home from a conference at Washington with Chairman Gardner of the International Joint Commission, reports that an executive conference of the commission will be held at St. Paul September 4, preceding the public hearings on levels of the Lake of the Woods, to begin at Warroad September 7.

Winona.—The body of Ben McAllister, who was drowned when a skiff in which he was riding with two other companions capsized, was recovered. It was floating just below the Burlington railway bridge at the east end of this city, a mile and a half below where the drowning occurred. The dead man was 55 years of age and single.

Brainerd.—Thinking his pal behind him ready to take the purse, John Mack, an alleged pickpocket, extracted it from the pocket of a farmer at the Lum park picnic, extended it behind him and loosed his hold. A little girl, instead of his alleged confederate, Joe Durich, picked it up and the farmer's attention was attracted. Mack and Durich were arrested.

Winona.—The Northwestern Railway company, according to a statement at the general offices of the division, expects to handle as many as 75,000 carloads of grain on the Minnesota and Dakota divisions. It is said that only a sweeping storm of widespread area could now damage the crop. Many of the cars to be employed in moving crops are new.

St. Cloud.—Ludwig Robbers, 83 years old, the last surviving member of St. Cloud's original city council, is dead at his home in Sauk Rapids. He was born in Germany and came to this country in 1844, and to St. Cloud in 1856. During the Indian war Robbers carried dispatches by order of the governor to Paynesville and Forest City and for this service was awarded a state pension.

Fergus Falls.—Fire destroyed the horse barn at the state insane hospital in this city. Nine horses were burned to death and there was a considerable loss of hay, harnesses and rigs. The fire broke out shortly before midnight in the haymow. One theory is that tramps crawled in to sleep there, and another is that the fire was due to spontaneous combustion, from heating of new mown hay.

Brainerd.—Fears entertained at river towns farther south that reservoirs of the upper Mississippi river are full to bursting and due to cause as much damage to the Twin Cities as last year, are without foundation. Dam caretakers say there is absolutely no danger. Due to small cloud-bursts, the rainfall in June last year was 10.79 inches. This year it is 7.33 inches; July last year, 2.54 inches; this year, 4.24 inches.

Winona.—The authorities are looking for the body of Ben McAllister, who is believed to have been drowned in the Mississippi river here. In company with Charles Cusin and Harry White, he had been visiting a camp across the river. On the way back their boat overturned. Cusin and White swam to safety, but McAllister disappeared, and while he was not actually seen to go down it is felt that drowning was his fate.

Duluth.—The quarterly meeting of the traffic managers of the constituent companies of the United States Steel corporation was held in Duluth with about twenty of the traffic men from outside the city present. The members went in a special train to the steel plant at Morgan park, and later they left for the Mesabi range.

St. Paul.—Minnesota has received, during the fiscal year, \$230,697.88 royalty from mineral contracts in the royalty class and \$6,700 from those not yet in this class, but for which an annual rental of \$100 per lease per year is received.
