

## WARREN SHEAF

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### Tuberculosis Sanatorium Site.

Both the Middle River Pioneer and the Argyle Banner state in their issues for last week that the Middle River site for the proposed Marshall-Roseau counties' tuberculosis sanatorium, has been turned down by the state advisory commission, after the joint locating committee had decided in favor of Middle River. The ground on which the state commission withheld its approval of the Middle River site is stated by the Pioneer to be, "that it was too difficult of access for the people of western Marshall county and would necessitate the stopping over night in Thief River Falls of all visitors from the western part." Both papers very unjustly blame Warren for Middle River's failure to secure the approval of the state commission for its site. As far as the people of Warren are concerned, the Sheaf can state without fear of contradiction that they have not turned a hand one way or another to influence the selection of a site for the sanatorium. The people of Warren and especially its physicians and its anti-tuberculosis association, have done more than those of any other locality, to work up public sentiment in favor of the establishment of such an institution, and without their efforts the project would likely not have received favorable consideration at this time. They have worked disinterestedly and unselfishly for what they considered a grand humanitarian cause, the alleviation of suffering of those afflicted with a dread disease, without any thought of reward of one kind or another. The question of a site has hardly entered their minds, but the securing of the sanatorium for the benefit of the afflicted has been the great object. We have noticed that Middle River, even before any steps had been taken to establish a sanatorium, had preempted the site for the institution. We are told that the site selected is a very beautiful one and from a scenic point of view can hardly be excelled. The Sheaf on various occasions has spoken favorably of the Middle River site. No one in Warren has any animus or ill feeling toward Middle River at all, as these papers want to make out. In fact, we would have been pleased to see Middle River get the sanatorium, altho it will not be as great a boon to the locality where it is located as is imagined, because, being a state institution, most of its supplies will be furnished under contract by the board of control. Many towns would object as strenuously to having such an institution as to having a pest house for small pox patients or lepers. Strictly speaking, the site for a charitable institution like a sanatorium should not be decided according to the whims or interests of politicians, but according to its accessibility for the people of the county and suitability for the purpose intended. Evidently the state commission had these facts in view when it failed to approve of the Middle River site. The site which we are informed the state commission favors and for which one member of the county commission, Dr. Anderson, voted, is near Anita, in close proximity to the three lines of railway that converge at Thief River Falls, and that may be conveniently reached by patients and visitors from all points of the Great Northern line from Warroad and Roseau down, from Strandquist and Newfolden and all points on the Winnipeg branch of the Soo railway, and from Stephen, Argyle, Warren, Alvarado, Oslo and all points in the western part of the county via the Wheat line of the Soo. This site can be reached within two or three miles, from either of these roads, without the necessity of stopping off at Thief River Falls or changing cars. A patient from Roseau will need to remain on the train but a few minutes longer than if going to Middle River, that is all. This site would also be as convenient to reach by most of the people in the eastern part of the county, as would the Middle River site. It is these facts, we presume, that weighed heavily with the state advisory commission. It should be borne in mind that the members of the county commission who voted for the Anita site did so not specially to accommodate Warren, as both Argyle and Stephen, and Alvarado and Oslo, in fact the whole western part of the county would be equally favored. This is not a Warren scheme, as has been charged. If Middle River is the best and most accessible location for the sanatorium, then by all means let it be located there, but if the Anita site will serve the people of the county better, we see no reason why it should not be selected. That is evidently what the state advisory commission thought, and they are men who have given their lives to fighting the tuberculosis plague, are wholly disinterested, and should know what is the best thing for this county to do under the circumstances. But, brethren, let us not fight about the site to such an extent that we lose the sanatorium—the main thing.

Following the war there may be a change in the rating of the great navies of the world. Uncle Sam's is the only one not suffering at present.




