

## UNITED STATES FOOD ADMINISTRATION.

Federal Food Administrator For Minnesota.

To Minnesota Farmers:

This letter is to ask you, and through you any other farmer whose address we do not possess, to individually and collectively aid in carrying out Minnesota's part in the war program of the nation.

There are three things Minnesota must furnish: 1. Food; 2. Men; 3. Money.

Men and money are as important as food, but the State cannot play so important a part in these as it can in supplying food. We can and will furnish our share of men and money, but because of the extent of our agriculture and the great surplus of food we produce above our own needs, we can contribute most generously of food products.

We hope that you and your neighbors will subscribe liberally for Liberty Bonds. Every man and woman who can do so should own one or more Liberty Bonds. They are the best possible investment and in addition to this the saving habit formed is worth many times the value of the bond. They are absolutely safe; can be converted readily into money at or more than par at any time, and the more guns, ammunition, food and equipment we furnish our men the fewer we will lose.

### Facts About Food.

There is enough food in the United States and in the countries fighting as our Allies so that everyone may have plenty if it is carefully distributed and used. We have in the United States an abundance of corn, vegetables, fruits, poultry, fish, sea foods and coarse grains, such as barley, oats and rye. There is not enough wheat, meat, fat and sugar to go around, if we use as much as we are accustomed to use.

Every American who wants to do his full share (his bit) in the war may render a real service by using 25 per cent less wheat, meat, fat and sugar than he has been accustomed to use, and to use in place of these, vegetables, fruits, fish, sea foods and coarse breads, as corn bread, rye bread, etc.

Our European Allies are using war breads made of rye, barley, buckwheat, potatoes and a small proportion of wheat flour, and they absolutely must have wheat from here. The only way we can spare wheat flour this year is to economize in its use. They naturally use less than half as much meat as we do because they do not produce corn, and now France and England are on a ration of 21 pounds of sugar yearly per capita, while we have been using about 90 pounds of sugar yearly per capita.

people in the country are as saving as they well can be, but I am sure that in every home many of the things that are plentiful may be substituted for things that are scarce without increasing cost of reducing quantity of food used.

### Democracy or Autocracy.

We must demonstrate that democracy can be made efficient. We can do this not by making it necessary to issue bread cards, sugar and meat cards in this country as they do in autocratic countries, but by demonstrating that we can by our own free will restrain ourselves in the use of things that we know to be scarce.

It is the desire of the United States Food Administration that we do this voluntarily. To accomplish this and to make sure that everyone understands the needs, it is planned to canvass every home in the country and to ask every one to accept free membership in the Food Administration by signing the Food Administration Pledge, and to practice the required saving of wheat, meat, fat and sugar in their own homes during the war. This canvass will be made in Minnesota during the week of November 4 to 11.

I ask you most earnestly to assist with this campaign by discussing the matter freely at home and among your neighbors and wherever you may have an opportunity to speak publicly. May we not hope that you will cooperate with everyone in your county and community who is carrying on this work? I ask you especially to encourage your teacher and the pupils in your schools to assume the task of making a house to house canvass to secure the signature of the food pledge of every home in your community.

Hundreds of thousands of people already are denying themselves many of the common necessities of life which were commonly used before the war. We are sure that you will do everything in your power to save everything you can, so that our soldiers will have sufficient nourishment and strength to win this war.
