## Minnesota State News

Cook—John Vege, Owens, was seriously gored by a bull here.

Duluth—Daniel Hogan, former chief of police of Duluth, died here.

Brainerd—The 2-week-old baby son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Davis, was smothered to death in bed.

Aitkin—Judge W. C. McClenahan, Brainerd, has denied an application to drain Big Rice lake, famous duck hunting ground.

Bemidji—Kenneth Mohler, 12 years old and Eloy Gustafson, 13 years old, were drowned in Lake Bemidji when they broke through the ice while skating.

Wilbert—A new \$12,000 German Lutheran school has been dedicated here. Professor Theodore Buenger of Concordia college, St. Paul, delivered the dedicatory address.

Bemidji—Forest C. Halgren of Bemidji has been named to succeed Deputy United States Marshall Frank Bradley, who was recently transferred to the Duluth district.

East Grand Forks—The equipment and horses of the city fire department have been moved into the fire hall of the new city hall, this section of the building being now practically completed.

East Grand Forks—At a meeting of the school board an increase of \$10 per month in wages was granted to practically the entire teaching staff of the East Grand Forks public schools.

Eyota—F. W. Woodcock, well-known citizen of this vicinity, lost his right arm up to the elbow as the result of an accident which befell him while operating his corn shredding machine.

Luverne—Martin Dollander has the distinction of harvesting the largest number of bushels of corn per acre in southwestern Minnesota. A 30 acre field of white dent corn averaged 110 bushels to the acre.

Austin—Lee Bauman and Henry Harma, Wellsberg, Iowa, are dead from injuries received when a train struck their automobile two miles north of Lyle. The injured men were rushed to this city where they died three hours later.

Buhl—Anthrax, the dread cattle disease, contracted from using a new shaving brush, is credited by local physicians with having caused the death of William Latunen, employed in the Wade mine, after an illness of barely a week.

Stillwater—Jamieson, Thoreen & Sandeen, who have a contract for the construction of a new county road from Boom Coulee to Marine-St. Croix, appeared before the board of county commissioners here and got an extension of their contract to July 1, next.

Virginia—I. W. W. agitators reported to be working among lumberjacks working for the Rainy Lake Lumber company north of here, seeking to foment trouble, appear to have met with partial success as it was stated that ninety men quit at Camp 61 of the company for no known reason.

Bemidji—Andrew Anschwogel and his son Michael paid a fine of \$75 and \$100 respectively in municipal court here when found guilty of shooting deer out of season. The arrest of the two men followed the accidental killing of another son, Anthony, by the father. A coroner's jury exonerated the father of all blame.

Rochester—The worst fire in several months swept a portion of Rochester business district causing a loss of about \$25,000. The fire started in the basement of the Wagener hotel and spread to several stores on the ground floor. The Conrad Fur company of Winona was the heaviest loser, sustaining about \$15,000 damage.
