LOCAL SHIPPING ASSOCIATION HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING.

The Rosewood Live Stock Shipping Association held their third annual meeting at Rosebank school last Saturday afternoon, but on account of quite cold and stormy weather not many were present. The Secretary and Managers report showed that during the past year 194 head of cattle had been shipped through the association, which had brought a net price of \$1,798.16. The sinking fund showed a net balance of \$37.75. All shipping during the year had been very successful, and the prices received had in general been satisfactory. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Marshall county agent in regard to the testing of cattle for tuberculosis, in which several members were interested. A special meeting will be called later to further discuss this move. Election of directors for the coming year resulted in Messrs. Thom Holten, Selmer Haugen, Emil Anderson, Selmer Sorenson and John Sjolvsold being elected. Joel Shoberg was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer. The rating of sheep in shipping mixed carloads was again changed after the manager had explained that the present rating was dissatisfactory, and will hereafter be 15 cents higher than the rate of cattle. The rate on hogs was unchanged. Bernhard Ranum acted as chairman during this meeting as both the president and vice president were absent.

E. P. Johnson while sawing wood with his gasoline rig at the C. Mellem farm last Saturday, had the misfortune of getting his left hand too near the saw with the result that his first finger was cut off and the second badly gashed. He left in the evening for Thief River Falls to secure medical aid. It is believed his second finger must also be removed. Mr. Johnson is an aged man, dependent solely on his work for support, which makes the accident doubly regrettable.

A. E. Bowen, a prominent Nonpartisan speaker was in town last Monday and delivered a stirring lecture on the principles of the Nonpartisan program to an attentive audience at the Victor Mosbeck residence northwest of town.
