RED CROSS CHAPTER HELD ANNUAL MEETING

Services of Miss Loretta Newman, Welfare Nurse, to be Continued Another Year

The annual meeting of the Marshall County Chapter of the American Red Cross was held in the court room of the court house at Warren last Thursday afternoon and was attended by a goodly number of people who are interested in the work of the organization. Chairman Bernard B. Brett called the meeting to order and Miss Agnes Stevning served as secretary. Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: Bernard B. Brett, chairman; Mrs. J. J. Sinclair, vice chairman; Miss Agnes Stevning, secretary; and H. J. Yetter, treasurer. A county Executive Board of the Red Cross was chosen, consisting of the following persons: Dr. I. G. Whittrout, of Oslo; Mrs. Louis Sands, Alvarado; Mrs. H. G. Kramer, Radium; Miss Ottine Rokke, Strandquist; Mrs. Lawrence Holan and Mrs. J. Vezina, Argyle; Mrs. E. Wright and Mrs. R. Porteous, Middle River, and Mrs. D. Farrel of Warren.

Miss Loretta Newman, county child welfare nurse in the employ of the Chapter, gave a very good report of the humanitarian work she has been called upon to do during the past year. Her work covers a wide range of activities and subjects, such as work in aid of the blind, cripples, feeble minded and epileptics, mental pycopathics, delinquent children, neglected children of unmarried mothers, placements and adoptions of children, cases of non support, county allowances for mothers, broken homes, and many other lines of work where a helping hand is needed. The value of such welfare work is too great to be measured by dollars and cents. Many an unfortunate person or family has been given the right kind of advice and help by the service Miss Newman has rendered.

A financial report for the year was submitted by the secretary. It showed that with the money on hand it would be possible to continue the services of the welfare nurse only until January 1st. But in view of the good work that Miss Newman is doing and the great need of such work in the county, the Chapter voted in favor of continuing her services during the coming year, hoping that the next Red Cross Roll Call, together with appropriations expected from the county board, will provide the funds needed to pay Miss Newman's salary.

An effort will be made to secure a largely increased membership at the next Roll Call, which will commence Nov. 11. Mrs. N. O. Stadium, of Warren, was chosen as the chairman of the Roll Call and she will be assisted by local workers in all parts of the county.

The Warren branch met after the meeting of the Chapter and organized by electing Mrs. Judith Peterson, president; Mrs. J. O. Horrick, vice president and Mrs. A. B. Nelson, secretary and treasurer.

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
