

RURAL TEACHERS ATTEND INSTITUTE

Instructors from the State Department of Education and Moorhead State Teachers' College are here to train and inspire the teachers of the county.

One of the largest and best teachers' institutes held in the county opened Monday for a five-day session. One hundred thirty-five rural teachers and also eleven students from the Teachers' Training department of the Warren School are in attendance at the institute to receive instruction in the science and art of teaching. Supt. David Johnson feels that this institute is particularly good because the state department of education has recognized the county to the extent of sending as instructors two prominent institute workers from said department and one from the Moorhead Teachers' College. These instructors are: Geo. A. Selke, State Inspector of Rural Schools; Miss Anna Swenson, Assistant State Inspector of Rural Schools; and Miss Margaret Bierie, of the Moorhead State Teachers' College. Mr. Selke conducts special study in hand-writing and the making of a county age grade scale and a grade progress table; Miss Swenson gives lectures on methods of teaching and other school room topics; and Miss Bierie instructs in methods, library classification and citizenship. Supt. Johnson and Assistant Supt. Luttrell also assist in instructing the teachers and encouraging them in their work. The sessions are held in the court room at the court house.

The teachers are all interested in the work of the institute and at its close will return to their respective schools better equipped to meet the problems confronting them in the school room and also inspired to render better service than before.
