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Minnesota butter is of such great excellence and value that thieves and bandits frequently enter creameries to remove the product. The other day two men stole 18 tubs of butter from the creamery at Rice, Minn. Evidently they had tasted the butter and could not resist the temptation.

Dr. Copeland, health commissioner of New York, makes the statement that the span of human life has increased ten years during the past fifty years. The average length of life now is 53 years while fifty years ago it was 43 years. People who are married, he says, live longer than those who are single. He also states that there are now in the United States 3,500 persons who are past 100 years of age.

Mr. Butler's confirmation by the senate is a foregone conclusion. It is charged that Mr. Butler is a man who is prejudiced in favor of big corporations, having been employed generally as an attorney to fight their cases in court. The president probably could have selected a man from the large number of eminent men with judicial training in this state that would have been better known among the people than is Mr. Butler, and for that reason would have given better satisfaction. Minnesota, however, should feel honored that the President has selected one of her citizens for the great office. It is a great honor indeed. We hope that Mr. Butler, if his nomination is confirmed will so discharge his high duties that he will prove all charges of prejudice that have been brought against him.

**MINNESOTA HAS NEW
 HOLSTEIN MILK CHAMPION**

Grahamholm Colantha Pauline Segis is the latest Minnesota Holstein cow to acquire a world's championship for milk and butter production. As a senior four-year-old she has just completed a 365-day semi-official test with a record of 34,291.8 pounds milk containing 1,141.4 pounds fat equivalent to 1,426.76 pounds butter. She is owned by Christopher Graham of Rochester. By this great performance she displaces another high producing Minnesota Holstein cow, Princess Aaggie Polkadot De Kol, whose yearly record is 31,600.7 pounds milk containing 1,815.6 pounds butter. This latter cow is owned by H. F. Fischer of Shakopee.

A study of the records of the Grahamholm cow covering this test show that her best seven day's production is 840.7 pounds milk containing 34.57 pounds butter. Her best production for 30 consecutive days is 3,457.2 pounds milk containing 143.89 pounds butter. Her daily average is 93.9 pounds milk for 365 consecutive days, which makes her the champion milk producing cow of Minnesota for all ages and breeds.

It is a significant fact that both milk and butter championships of the world in the four-year division are held by Minnesota Holstein cows. Grahamholm Colantha Pauline Segis is now the champion producer for both milk and butter in the senior four-year-old class. The junior four-year-old championship recently was awarded to Mamsell Johanna of the C. L. Spaulding Farm, Warren; while the highest record butter producer of the world in this class is Queen Pieber Mercedes, owned by E. C. Schroeder of Moorhead.
