CITY GLOBULES.

There were forty-nine lodgers in the city hall at midnight, and not a prisoner of any degree. John Jacobson, adjudged insane by the probate court yesterday, will be taken to St. Peter this morning. The first annual hall of the order of railroad conductors, will be given on the 20th inst., at Sherman hall. The Christian church (Disciples) will give an oyster supper at the Odd Fellows' dining hall this (Wednesday) evening, the 13th. The opera house will be lighted by electric light throughout some time during this week. The electric light will take the place of gas. The appeal bond was approved by Judge Nelson yesterday in the case of David Borton against the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railroad company. A gentleman residing in St. Paul, who returned from Devils Lake yesterday, says that on Saturday last, 292 claims were filed at the land office at that place, representing 50,000 acres of land. The suit of Bronson & Folsom against the St. Croix Lumber company has been transferred from the district to the United States circuit court. The action is for \$22,000 damages, for the loss of a number of logs. About 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon an aged man named James Litten, fell down in a fit at the corner of Third and Robert streets. Officer Daly put him in a hack and he was conveyed to the city hall, where he soon recovered. Mr. E. F. Irvine has contributed a valuable book to the archives of the historical society, being the records of the old Pioneer Guard for the period between 1859 and 1861, during which years Mr. Irvine was secretary of the society. The citizens on St. Anthony hill are loud in their praises of James McGuire, the former of the stables of the street car company, at that point, for the thorough manner in which he keeps the track clear for rapid transit in that locality. The Van Hoven Live Stock Co. commenced an action in the district court yesterday against Peter Cizek, to collect \$2,924, for goods sold. An attachment was also issued, accompanied by affidavits to the effect that defendant had concealed his property from the creditors. The defendant is the defendant treasurer of Clay county. The case of the state of Minnesota, respondent, vs. M. Bruggeman, appellant, on appeal to the supreme court, was decided against the latter yesterday. Bruggeman fenced in half the highway at Rose in front of an eighty acre lot, and the town authorities pulled it down. He then erected it again and was sued and fined \$10 and costs. Harry, a bright and beautiful boy of nearly three years, son of Crawford and Mary Livingston, died yesterday of membranous croup. He was taken ill on Sunday night, and in spite of the best care and medical skill, the disease resulted fatally. The funeral takes place at 11 a. m. to-morrow, from the residence of the parents, No. 547 St. Peter street. A telegram was received at the executive room at the state capitol yesterday morning from the attorney of the city and county of New York that the proceedings against Daniel B. Vermilye, under indictment for larceny, had been withdrawn, and latter a dispatch was received from Gov. Grover Cleveland, of that state, revoking the requisition made for Mr. Vermilye. Gen. A. C. Hawley, late adjutant general, who returned from Washington Saturday, has opened an office with John B. Oliver & Co., over the American Express company, corner of Wabasha and Fourth streets, for the prosecution of pension claims. Gen. The Harder Fire Grenades. The test yesterday afternoon, at the corner of Minnesota and Fourth streets, of the Harder hand grenade fire extinguisher, was the most successful of any yet given in the city. A heap of boxes, wood and shavings were well saturated with pitch and kerosene, and after getting well in blaze a couple of the hand grenades were broken, and instantly the whole was a black heap, not even smoke ascending from it, the fire being so completely extinguished. The same result was had with a large punch-bowl, filled with inflammable material, and boxes on top, as the fire could not exist where the gas from the grenades reached. Fort Sully Burned. A dispatch was received by Gen. Terry at department headquarters yesterday, to the effect that Fort Sully, D. T., was on fire, and that three wings of the quarters had already burned down. The telegram stated that the mercury was ten degrees below zero, and that the fourth wing of the fort would probably be saved. The quarters burned were occupied as barracks by the troops, there being stationed at Fort Sully, companies A, D, E and K, and the band of the Eleventh Infantry. The troops were commanded by Col. Richard I. Dodge. No information is at hand as to how the fire started.

It is the intention of the authorities to have the new department for the next fall term.
