ALMOST A SENSATION.

A Wronged Girl Buries Her Seven-Months' Child in a Snow Drift.

A young woman was observed late yesterday afternoon trudging along Decatur street, evidently very ill, and was taken into a house on that street, in front of which she had fallen down upon the snow, and a hackman, named Charles Alberts, summoned to take her to the headquarters hotel, 1009 Ross street, near post siding. She was placed in the covered hack, but before arriving at her destination called on the hackman to stop, and according to his story, jumped out of the door and jammed something into a snow bank on the side of the road. Alberts followed her up and asked her what she was doing and what night it was she had thus concealed and she said it was her pocketbook. He then conveyed her to her destination, and going back discovered the body of a seven months' infant, and and at once reported to the police. The janitor went out immediately with several of the force and were soon followed by Coroner Quinn and Detective Ahern in the hack of the funeral home. On reaching the headquarters hotel the coroner attended to the sick girl, and after examination, found that she had a miscarriage and had sought to hide the still-born result. She had been a domestic in the hotel for six months, and left there a week ago for work on St. Anthony hill, and after a day's washing feeling ill had undertaken to make a journey which brought her case into public view. Her name was Mattie Wilson Ramsay and her seducer Swan Olgard, a machinist at the Harvester Works, was present and doing everything in his power for her comfort and saying he would do right by her, the coroner and police left the unfortunate in his care without further action.

Sauk Centre Academy of Individual Instruction.

The above school has enrolled ninety-five students during the past four months. There will be some vacant places next month. The system is individual recitation. The advantage of the system is apparent. It does justice to each student according to his capacity. SHELL LAKE, WIS.

Sherman Hall, in jail here on the charge of committing a fishish outrage upon the eight year old daughter of Mr. Nellis, will have a preliminary examination before Judge Thompson on Tuesday. It is understood that he will be defended by Kinsman & Lamereop, of Cumberland, and Judge Swift, of Rice Lake. The little girl is still under the care of Dr. Perley and is suffering from several injuries produced upon her person. The prisoner is, to external appearances, indifferent and unconcerned. He is about 18 years of age. His parents live at Cumberland, Wis. He himself has worked in the mills here during the summer, and beyond being somewhat given to running after loose women, and having some bad associates, nothing is known against him. No one would have believed him guilty of committing such a brutal deed, but there appears to be no doubt of his guilt. While the whole community feels justly indignant and outraged the general sentiment seems to favor letting the law take its course. Rumors of lynching that have got into the papers have no other foundation than that some men came in from the camps and got on general drunk and got off a little harmless wind.

High License Wins.

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—The supreme court of Illinois has affirmed the judgment of the lower court in the case of Timm vs. Harrison, mayor of Chicago, thereby asserting the constitutionality of the Harper high license. This was a suit brought by Timm on behalf of the state liquor dealers' association of Illinois against the mayor of Chicago, to compel him to issue to the complainant a \$103 saloon license under the city ordinance passed prior to the time the Harper law went into effect, July 1, 1883. The mayor refused to issue it on the ground that the Harper law required the payment of \$500 for license to sell spirituous liquors within the state. Timm's bill urged the unconstitutionality of the Harper law, and the matter being carried to the supreme court the latter decided against Timm and pronounced the act constitutional. The only matter now before the supreme court involves the validity of liquor licenses issued by the city of Chicago to saloon keepers the past year for \$103, and thus attempting to evade the effect of the Harper law nearly twelve months.
