CONGRESSIONAL. The Naval Appropriation Bill, After More Wrangling and Amendments, Passes. The Senate. WASHINGTON, March 6.-Among the memorials presented was one by Senator Cockerill, from the United Labor organizations of St. Louis, protesting against the attempts of employes, as illustrated by recent events in Connecticut, to reduce the compensation of American labor to a point on a level with the pauper labor of Europe, and praying for the passage of laws to restrict the wholesale migration intended to effect the reduction of the wages of American working men. In presenting the memorial and moving its reference to the committee on education and labor, Cockerill took occasion to commend it to the serious consideration of that committee. It was referred.
