SAID an intelligent and highly respectable member of the trade's assembly: "There are very few members of our organization who can vote for Pillsbury, owing to his attitude respecting the convict labor question. He may come out and try to undo his action respecting that chamber of commerce contract, but it will have no effect. We know him, and will oppose his candidacy."

It is reported that B. F. Nelson is seeking the Democratic nomination for alderman in the second ward; but as the party owes him nothing, and furthermore as he repeatedly broke faith with the party while serving in the city council as an alderman from the First ward, it is highly probable that his candidacy will be retired upon the first ballot.

The Democrats of the Fourth Ward will meet in caucus in chemical engine house to-morrow evening, and it seems certain that Ed. Clement will be nominated for the aldermanic long term candidacy. Who will be placed in nomination for the short term is doubtful. There are several candidates who are eligible and desirable.

It is reported that the Republican bosses have made certain pledges to Mr. Wyman, and that was one of the agencies employed in inducing him to withdraw from the mayoralty contest. But it is difficult for those who have known Mr. Wyman well to believe that he would become a party to such a bargain.

The Republicans are arranging to pack the Democratic caucuses in the hope of creating a bitter dissension of factions. They will be watched, however, and, if necessary, they will be perpetually fired.

The name of Chas. M. Foote, a popular and consistent young Democrat, is mentioned by his hosts of friends for the nomination for city controller at the convention to be held on the 18th.

The Prohibitionists are manifestly indignant at Mr. Wyman for violating faith. They will, however, place in nomination a man who will stick.

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SHOT AND KILLED.

WILMINGTON, Clinton county, Ohio, March 9.—At 7 o'clock last evening the city marshal, John T. Vandoren, was shot in the head and killed instantly, by Alfred Ballard, a drunkenman, when under arrest and on his way to prison in charge of the marshal. It required great discretion to prevent the crowd from lynching Ballard while on the way to jail after the murder. As it was, some person unknown cut Ballard in the side.

THEY WANT TO LYNCH HIM. LINCOLN, Ill., March 9.—The sheriff received a telephone message last night that a mob had formed at Chestnut, for the purpose of coming here and lynching Hall in jail, charged with the triple murder, near Mount Pulaski, about a year ago. The sheriff removed the prisoner from the jail and secreted him in a private house under a guard all night. The mob, learning that the sheriff had been warned, cut the telephone wire and dispersed. It is rumored they are coming to-night, and the sheriff is preparing to guard the prisoner.

THE TRIPLE MURDER. MAROA, Ill., March 9.—Wm. Hougland was arrested to-day charged with complicity in the triple murder at Mt. Pulaski. The detectives say another arrest will soon be made.
