PARIS, March 11.—Tonquin advises report that a French column advancing upon Bac Ninh from Haiphong, has had a successful engagement with the enemy.

ROME, March 11.—Cardinal Sacconi has been appointed dean of the sacred college, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Cardinal Pietro.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 11.—Yesterday was the czar's birthday. Gen. von Schmitz, German ambassador, presented his majesty with an autograph letter from the Emperor William, congratulating the czar.

LONDON, March 11.—The court of the queen's bench has decided that Lady Aylesford's bequest "cancels her husband's will and that she is entitled to her share of the property."

PARIS, March 11.—The committee of the chamber of deputies, to which the question of the importation of pork had been referred, decided to subject to the approval of the government, to consist of the members of the various departments upon the matter.

LONDON, March 11.—Orders are given to a detachment of marines at Chatham to proceed immediately to the Soudan.

PARIS, March 11.—A box addressed to Comte de Paris, and seized in Lyons, contained dynamite sufficient to kill many persons.

ST. SUKUM, March 12, morning.—The Highlanders, working on the intrenched fort at Zariba, were attacked by Osman Digma's army at 6 o'clock last evening.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE LITTLE FALLS WATER POWER COMPANY OF MINNESOTA.
