A FATAL FALL.

La Horre, the Acrobat, Fatally Injured at Pence Opera House.

His Neck Broken by a Fall From the Ceiling Into the Parquet.

A terrible and fatal accident happened at Pence Opera house, which cast a gloom upon Minneapolis last night. Albert La Horre was performing upon the trapeze suspended over the parquet and just in the rear of the orchestra rail, during the week. He also did the act of walking inverted, with his feet caught in tepee or clasps secured to a bar.

Damaging Testimony before the Springer Committee Relative to Brewster.

The Reduction on Various Imports as Provided for by the Morrison Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—[Special Telegram to the Globe.] The effect of the Morrison bill as reported from the committee on ways and means have been printed for the use of the members of the house, and are absolutely necessary to enable any one to find out what the proposed rates of duty are, and aside from carpet wools, which do not come in competition with domestic wools, the wools most imported into this country are clothing and combing wools, worth not more than thirty cents a pound.
