Below will be found the call for the Democratic city convention and ward caucuses.

DEMOCRATIC CITY CONVENTION. Will be held at the city hall on Tuesday, the 25th day of March, 1884, at 2 o'clock p. m., to nominate candidates for city officers, as follows: A mayor, city recorder and city treasurer. The first ward will elect one member to representatives as follows, based upon last fall's vote for governor and attorney general, on the basis for each twenty-five Democratic votes or major fraction thereof: First ward, 8; Second ward, 8; Third ward, 8; Fourth ward, 5.

Persons not otherwise directed by the ward committees, it is requested, to attend the ward caucuses be held on Thursday, March 20, 1884, at the usual places of holding elections in each ward, commencing at 7 o'clock, and that the polls be held open to 8 o'clock p. m.

The several wards will each nominate one member to be elected to the city council. The first ward will nominate one member of board of education in place of Mr. Wiswell, and one member to serve two years, in each ward for said board.
