**CITY GLOBULES.**

The thing is being done very quietly, but the snow and ice are on the get up and get this far this month.

The directors of the alms-house and hospital met yesterday and issued thirty-one orders for wood and provisions.

Major McLaughlin, and Sitting Bull, the great American squatter, will leave tonight for the Standing Rock agency.

That artificial dummy at city hall yesterday morning, sent the chills way down through the heels of Joe's boots when he spied it.

The Sun Insurance, of San Francisco, was admitted by State Insurance Commissioner A. R. McGill yesterday, to do business in Minnesota.

The board of public works in committee meeting last evening, hard at work wrestling on the proposed assessments for the Seventh street fill.

Herman Wurtz, of 157 West Third street, had his little three year old daughter Annie stray away from home yesterday, and would be glad to hear her whereabouts.

Gus Lemke, a printer, who was arrested on Wednesday night for drunkenness, developed signs of delirium tremens at city hall yesterday, and was lodged in the county jail.

The committee on streets, of the city council will hold a meeting at 7:30 o'clock this evening, when it is expected that the street railway question will receive another airing.

The attorneys for the defense in the Weingaertner case were Messrs. John W. Willis and Gebhardt Wallrich. The names were erroneously given in the report of the trial yesterday.

D. J. Smith of Hinckley, charged with selling liquor to Indians, entered a plea of guilty before Judge Nelson yesterday, and in view of extenuating circumstances in the case a light fine was imposed.

The St. Paul club will shortly commence excavating for the proposed magnificent club house to be erected at the corner of Fourth and Cedar streets. The plans of the building have not yet been determined upon.

It's not the easiest job in the world to fool a Ramsey county criminal jury, and Judge Wilkin has been locking them up quite strongly for the preservation of peace and good order in the city for the past two terms of the court.

Officer Jerry Sullivan arrested James Sullivan in West St. Paul last evening on a warrant issued by Judge Burr. The charge was for disorderly conduct, and the patrol wagon gave James a ride over the bridge to the city hall.

The sheriff of Fargo, with four guards, arrived in this city yesterday, with John Clemons, John McMahon, Lewis Myers, Chas. C. Spencer, John Kane, John Riley, Geo. Coleman, Thos. Donovan and J. C. Rice, under sentence of from five to one year for robbery. They are to be placed in the territorial prison at Yankton.

During yesterday at the farmers' convention in the capitol, Mr. G. W. Haigh, of Blue Earth county, state secretary of the National Farmers' alliance, issued eleven charters for subordinate branches of the alliance. The organization has for its principal object the uniting of all persons engaged in agricultural pursuits to combat the encroachments of monopolists.

An action for \$10,000 damages was begun in the United States circuit court yesterday by Julian C. James, against Josiah E. Hayward and Peter Smith, of St. Cloud, Minnesota. It is alleged that the defendants caused an excavation to be left open and that on August first, 1883, the plaintiff, while proceeding along the street, fell into the hole, and was seriously injured. His damages are laid at the sum stated.

A very pleasant wedding was celebrated yesterday at the residence of Mr. Henry Lang, on the West side, when his niece, Miss Lizzie Schmedeman, was united in marriage to Mr. John Hinderer, well known in connection with Louis Reinhardt's resort. None but relatives of the contracting parties were present. Miss Mary Schmedeman, sister of the bride, acted as bridesmaid, and Ed. Hinderer, brother of the groom, as best man. The bride presents were numerous and valuable.

The lycium of the Y. M. C. A. gave a very interesting debate last evening at the rooms of the association. Owen Morris, president, presided. The subject under discussion was, should women have the right to vote? and Messrs. Alden, Armstrong and Root spoke on the affirmative and Messrs. Kirby, Septon and Connel on the negative. Messrs. Swift, Evans and Taylor, each sang a solo, and an interesting declamation—the Foundation of National Character—was given by Mr. J. P. Freeman. A large and appreciative audience was in attendance.
