THE WHISKY BILL.

The Representatives Have Another Lively Debate on This Bill.

A Large Grist of Reports from the Several Committees.

The House of Representatives.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The house is in committee of the whole on the bonded extension bill. The regular order being demanded Mr. Belford appealed to the house to allow one hour to be devoted to the senate bills on the speaker's table, and the appeal proving ineffectual, he solemnly declared that no more bills could be passed the remainder of the session.

Under call of committees the following reports were submitted:

By Mr. Nichols, from the committee on coinage, weights and measures, to establish an assay office at Deadwood. Referred to the committee of the whole.

By Mr. White, from the committee on foreign affairs, for the return of the balance of the Chinese indemnity funds. Referred to the committee of the whole.

By Mr. White, from the committee on patents, reported adversely, to reduce the time of patents to two years.

By Mr. Dockery, from the committee on accounts, to provide for one month's extra pay to certain employes of the house. To the committee of the whole.

By Mr. Cox, North Carolina, from the committee on the petition for a resolution, calling on the president for information as to what action had been taken in Venezuela under the provisions of the joint resolution, providing for a new mixed commission, and whether Venezuela declined to make payment afterwards. Referred to the committee of the whole.

The house then went into committee of the whole. Mr. Reagan in the chair, on the bonded extension bill.

Mr. Herbert resumed his argument against the bill, asserting that it was only by holding to the law that congress could expect to equalize the production and consumption. Permanent relief could only be accorded the distillers by compelling them to conduct their business on a sound basis. The passage of this bill will lead to an overwhelming demand for the repeal of the tax on whisky.

Mr. Clay said, the whisky business was made legitimate by the government, and demands the protection from congress which was granted to any other business or association. He denied the pending measure embodied special legislation, and maintained on the contrary that its object was to make a general law, and put whisky, beer and tobacco on the same footing in regard to taxation. It was a measure of relief which would prevent a crisis in the west. Who could do this, without detriment to the public interest, it should be done.

Mr. Thompson supported the bill, which, he said, presented the question, whether the government would bankrupt one class of citizens when it did not require for any purpose the money which would fall due for taxes. He was not in favor of demanding the "pound of flesh," and expressed his surprise that his friends from the south, Blount and Herbert, should uphold the policy of saying, "in the name of the law we demand the bankruptcy of these people." The question of temperance was not involved in the measure, but if the few temperance cranks in the house would vote for the bill it would result in keeping the whisky in bond and out of consumption.

Mr. Milliken, while denying he was a temperance crank, inquired whether even if the bill passed the whisky would not be taken out of bond in the course of time, to which Thompson replied, that it would pass into consumption when it was called out by some temperance cranks, for he had never seen one of that class, who, before making a speech would not step behind a door and wet his whiskie.

Mr. Clements opposed the bill. Mr. Breckenridge favored it. He made an exhaustive speech, in which he went into the history of the legislation affecting the whisky industry, described the hardships under which it existed now suffered, and maintained the equity and justice of the government stepping in and saving it from utter bankruptcy. His speech received a good deal of attention from his party associates.

Mr. Urey expressed his desire to see the entire internal revenue system wiped out.

Mr. Hancock opposed the bill, declaring that the bill asked the government to become the wet nurse of the big baby whisky interest.

Mr. Cutcherson said the question was a tri- angular one. He considered it from its business, revenue and moral aspect. He had expected some one to say the question was unconstitutional. The legislation making an appropriation for the food sufferers had been pronounced unconstitutional. It is unconstitutional, he said, to save a man from being drowned in water and constitutional to save men from being drowned in whisky.

Mr. Hepburn opposed the bill, and made an onslaught upon the achievements which the whisky interest had performed, declaring it had kept in the field, not armies, as has been alleged, but armies of paupers, crime and drunkenness.

Mr. Findlay said, if the bill passed, whisky would be made cheap, as cheap, perhaps, as gin was once in London, when advertisements were displayed, asserting that, "a man can get drunk here for a penny, dead drunk two pence." Before the conclusion of Findlay's speech, the committee rose.

Mr. Hancock, from the committee on appropriations, reported the pension appropriation bill. Referred to the committee of the whole.

Mr. Beach offered a resolution, calling on the secretary of the interior for copies of all leases made by him for the use or occupation of any ground in the Yellowstone National park, and also information whether the leases complied with the conditions of the lease, and as to the provisions made to prevent the wanton destruction of fish and game in the park. Adopted. Adjourned.

Iowa Legislation.

DES MOINES, Iowa, March 22.—The house to-day passed the following joint resolution, asking congress to pass a law giving every honorably discharged soldier and sailor in the late war a patent for 160 acres of land, without requiring them to settle thereon.

Also, for a law allowing all arriving soldiers of the late war, who were honorably discharged, a pension of \$8 per month during life. Also for the passage of the Robinson bill, granting pensions to all soldiers, sailors and marines, who were confined in rebel prisons, and \$2 a day for each so confined. A resolution was introduced for an amendment of the constitution, providing that the legislature shall meet on the second Monday in December, instead of in January as now provided. A bill was passed authorizing the governor to relinquish to the United States government all lands patented to the state of Iowa as provided by the act of congress, approved May 12, 1864, that have not been certified to railroads, as provided by the act of the general assembly, approved March 13, 1872. A joint resolution relative to the appointment of an agent for the collection of any amount that may be due the state of Iowa from the United States, as a refund of direct war tax, also as a refund of the interest on money advanced by the state during the civil war, was adopted.

The Charge of Fraud.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., March 22.—The congressional committee closed the investigation of the government work on Hot Springs creek to-day, and left for Washington. The allegations of fraud were not sustained. The preponderance of testimony shows the material used was good enough for the purpose. Col. L. C. How, United States engineer, and Col. A. A. Fleming, city engineer of Hot Springs, measured the work, found it a fraction less than the estimate made and collected on by the contractors.
