COMES TO A WHOA.

The "Hoss" Investigation Adjourned Without Date.

The Accusers Fall to Make Good Their Suspicions of a Nigger in the Fence.

The council fire committee resumed its investigation of fire department "hoss" dealing at the city hall last evening in which the parties who desired to have it appear that there were "twas" that were dark and tricks that were meant in the purchase of new and the sale of condemned horses failed signally to bring in competent evidence to support any of their allegations.

R. W. Bell was first called, and had no memory of a man named Wentworth, and while walking with Commissioner Schlick never heard Wentworth offer \$250 for condemned horses.

Frank Webber, the driver of steamer No. 2, had run the Bohn horses to several fires lately, and they never sinned with him, though by order of Chief Black he put on the brake and pushed them up a muddy hill; they were the best and truest horses in the department in his eye. A driver can take any high-spirited nervous horse, and whip, club and yell at him until he will refuse to obey his rein.

Commissioner Schlick had never heard of Drs. Berkman and commissions in connection with Dr. Berkman, the department's veterinary surgeon. He heard Harkny testify, and said he told him (Harkny) must not "be hard on the old man Dr. Berkman, because he could not pass his horses" and that anything else than that testified to in this matter as to conversation with him was a falsehood. He described the paying of \$1,188 to get the Chas. Brown horses because the city treasury was bare, so as to accommodate the department who needed these horses for which Brown had to have cash. Dr. Berkman said to him that Brown would pay him interest for the time he had to wait (fifteen days) for the city to reimburse him, and it was done by the advice of President Delano of the board. He testified that good and sufficient notice was given all over that the department had condemned horses for sale, that Dr. Berkman had his private sale in his hands, and all persons were referred to him. There were forty others present at their final auction sale besides the bidders. When Harkny brought his horses over to be looked at, Dr. Berkman would not take them because he said they were unfit for the service, and the commissioners would not take the responsibility and in short backed the doctor. He never had any talk with Wentworth on the street about the price of condemned horses and never had any talk with him except on business in his (Schlick's) store. He only told Harkny that "the old man was sorry he couldn't accept his horses." Bohn wanted \$720 last fall for his horses when Delano

wouldn't pay over \$550; as it was hard to find the right animals and Bohn asked but \$550 last spring, it was thought best all around to take them.

F. P. Berkman, son of the surgeon, wrote the \$1,100 check at his brother's office which he saw Schlick fill in and pay to Brown, and he saw Schlick count out \$88 in bills to Brown afterwards.

Assistant Chief Hildebrand testified to the unfitness for department work of the condemned horses, to the high prices of the Bohn team before the department had them, and to their faithful work on steamer No. 2.

The affidavit of James King of Brown county, who had sold horses to the department, that he never heard of any fees being asked for, was received and read.

Dr. Berkman's testimony was very practical and uncontradictory. He practiced his profession in St. Paul, Minneapolis, Hamilton and Oxford, Ohio, Franklin, Ind., and in the army three years. He was made surgeon for the St. Paul Fire Department Aug. 1, 1883, but accepted sixteen horses for \$1 and had standing orders from Mr. Delano to buy 1,450 and 1,600 weight stock. He had adopted the Chicago fire horse standard for St. Paul as near as he could, viz: sound barrel, from 16 to 16 1/2 hands high, 1,450 to 1,600 pounds weight, cushion hip, muscles running directly to stifle, and deep chest. This kind of horse could run and carry weight. He had a pride in the St. Paul department horses, which he had tried to buy of St. Paul parties as much as possible and had carefully examined 100 head to get the sixteen he had selected. He dodged heavy built, clumsy horses who could not run, and slender, narrow built, long backed horses, of which he found the St. Paul department stocked, such as "Jumbo" and "Lion," which were sold the city by G. Hordy for \$750, and were not worth a cent.
