Blaine to Throw Up His Good Chance for the Republican Nomination.

Lincoln to Have It, and If Elected Make Blaine Secretary of State.

Henry Ward Beecher's Talk Regarded as Inspired—Arthur's Extremity.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Notwithstanding President Arthur's previous determination not to employ any machinery of politics in aid of his nomination at Chicago, and to allow matters to shape their own course, and drift with the tide towards him, he has lately concluded to change the programme and take positive steps towards securing the election of candidates favorable to his candidacy.

PENDING BUSINESS.

Legislative Matters Which Have Precedence in Congress This Week.

How the Republican Senate Will Dodge the Shipping Bill Passed by the Democratic House.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—In the house tomorrow, after the usual call of states for the introduction of bills, the committee of the District of Columbia will be entitled to the floor.

The friends of the tariff bill expect that Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday will be devoted to the discussion of that measure.

Friday will be devoted to the discussion of private bills. The bill to amend the act to execute certain treaty stipulations relating to the Chinese, has been made a special order for Saturday.

The unfinished business in the senate is the pleuro-pneumonia bill. Senator Plumb has given notice that he will ask the senate to vote upon it, before the adjournment to-morrow.

The intention of Senator Hoar to ask consideration of the bill relating to bigamy, better known as the Mormon bill, as soon as the shipping bill is disposed of.

Matters of general legislation will probably be displaced for a day or two, during the week, by the Indian appropriation bill, and it is possible the agricultural bill, or the pension bill may be reported in season for action before the end of the week.

Arthur and the Virginia Delegation.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—A Richmond correspondent of the Star, in a letter summing up the lights and shades of the recent convention of the Readjusters, says of the six delegates-at-large: "Editor Yost, of Staunton, is an old friend of Blaine's and a former straight out. He is known to have expressed the opinion, a minute after the election, that Arthur had little or no chance for the nomination."

Presupposing that Blaine will not offer for the Chicago nomination and that Lincoln is his legatee, with absolute remainder to Blaine as secretary of state, if Lincoln shall be nominated and elected, Arthur is placed between two fires, with a small chance of escape from either.

Manitoba's Demands.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 27.—The situation in the Northwest is regarded here with considerable concern. The provincial legislature of Manitoba has formulated its demand of the Dominion government, and the whole provincial cabinet are on the way to Ottawa, to lay their case before the governor general.

Fox Backs the Jap.

NEW YORK, April 27.—Richard K. Fox offers to back the Japanese wrestler against Muldoon for from \$500 to \$5,000 a side, the match to take place in New York city, the conditions of the match to be two falls, Japanese style, two falls Gaeco-Roman style and if not decided in four bouts a fifth of catch-as-catch-can style to be wrestled.

The Straits of Mackinac Open.

MILWAUKEE, April 27.—Tug men report that the William Edwards, from Buffalo for Chicago, with coal, passed this port this afternoon, which would indicate that the straits are open.

The French Squadron in China.

PARIS, April 27.—The French government is preparing to reduce the French squadron in Chinese waters. The Tonquin flotilla will be limited to its present complement.

SULLIVAN.

His Address at Market Hall Last Evening to a Great Crowd.

Enthusiasm Aroused, and Liberal Gifts Offered to the League Fund.

The Work of Parnell and His Political Associates of Ireland Commended.

At half-past seven o'clock last evening the Emmet Light Artillery, three divisions of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, the Crusaders, and Father Matthew society assembled in front of the Metropolitan hotel, and headed by the First Regiment band escorted Hon. Alexander Sullivan, in a carriage accompanied by President William Louis Kelly of the St. Paul League and Adjutant General C. M. MacCarthy and Hon. P. H. Kelly to Market hall.

The procession was in perfect order and designated by a simple badge of their order attached to their citizens' garb. Market hall was already well filled when the procession, which had escorted Mr. Sullivan, arrived. The societies filed in and took the seats which had been reserved for them, and a few minutes later Mr. Sullivan, with a number of leading citizens, appeared upon the stage and was greeted with enthusiastic applause.
