CITY GLOBULES.

The internal revenue receipts yesterday were \$2,133. Inspector of Steamboats Gen. M. D. Flower returned yesterday from an official visit to Missouri river points. Action was begun in the United States circuit court yesterday by S. Schwab & Co. against Rudolph Zimmerman to enforce payment of a note for \$714. Ex-Officer Barney Smith while on a taw Friday night, got into a row and was thrown through the window of Fink & Knauff's shoe store on East Seventh street. The county treasury was made richer last week by the payment of \$78,000 real estate taxes. But twelve days now remain in which to give the 10 per cent. discount. A West Seventh street saloon has out the sign: "The latest order by the acting mayor is that every man shall have a bottle of whisky to last him till Sunday at 3 p. m." Lucy Hatfield was awarded \$2,000 damages by the jury yesterday for injuries received at Post Siding in alighting from a St. Paul & Duluth railway train, July 5, 1883. Joseph Saenger, an inmate of the workhouse and Eva Klinker of the city hospital, will be examined on information of insanity filed at the probate court to-morrow morning. Rev. His Little Family Left in Great Need of Charity. Corner Quinn and a jury held an inquest at O'Halloran's undertaking establishment yesterday, on the remains of Oscar Clark, who committed suicide at his humble home in the Sixth ward last Friday night. The inquest yesterday was most pathetic, and the grief of the family had come to St. Paul melted a heart of ice. She was present with her two children, and the beautiful and touching manner in which she gave her testimony appealed to all present. The deceased died without a cent or a penny as a cracker in the house, and the case is one that calls for the exercise of public and private charity. The jury were so strongly touched at her grief and poverty that it was said to their credit, they donated their fees to aid her and it is understood that a subscription will be taken up in her behalf. Dr. Quinn has kindly consented to receive all subscriptions for her. She now desires to family had come to St. Paul in her contributions. The jury consisted of Henry Belland, J. R. Stiver, Ed. Fitzgerald, Frank Grant, Louis Wenks and Wm. Gies. Mr. Gus Simons, owner of the house where he died, was admitted, was the first witness. He testified to having been called in by Mrs. Clark, who said her husband was dying; witness went for the doctor and called a priest. Had regarded the deceased as sober and willing to work. Sargeant Walsh testified to having been detailed to visit the house by Chief Clark; witness described the body and surroundings. Dr. Thomas testified that he had been called at 9:30 o'clock p. m.; he found the deceased bleeding to death from a wound in the limb; the femoral artery had been cut and death was necessarily the result. Officer Galvin testified to finding a bloody razor under the lounge where the deceased had been lying; the razor was put in evidence and the wound had been inflicted with this instead of the scissors as at first supposed. Mrs. Clark, the wife of deceased, was then present in all that calls for the exercise of public and private charity. The deceased was forty-four years of age; they had two children, four and six years of age; deceased had been feeling bad lately; he had worked on Monday but all day Friday he was sick; witness had gone to the postoffice Friday evening; returning she found her husband in bed; he was sweating and ap-

peared sick; he got out of bed and went to the lounge; after a short while he called out that he was bleeding to death; then she had called Mr. Simons. Deceased had been in the army; he studied medicine and practiced eight years; some times he took opium and slept for a whole day. The witness sobbed continuously. The jury found that death had resulted from a cut in the femoral artery inflicted by himself while under a fit of mental aberration. LOCAL MENTION.
