CITY GLOBULES.

A requisition for some one was received by Gov. Hubbard yesterday. The internal revenue receipts at Collector Brickett's office last week amounted to \$7,541.91.

The sum of \$18,000 was disbursed by the city treasurer yesterday in payment of interest on city bonds.

Chief Black will receive bids from city coal dealers to supply the department for the year until Monday.

A back pension of \$2,361 was received at the adjutant general's office yesterday for a veteran at Big Rapids, Mich.

Capt. Berger has charge of the Minnesota battle flags, which will be displayed in the grand army procession at Minneapolis tomorrow.

The Prescott trial against the city was resumed in the district court yesterday, the day being occupied in taking testimony for the defense.

All old soldiers in the city are requested to join Acker Post at the Union depot at 7:30 sharp, to-morrow morning to go up and participate in the parade at Minneapolis.

The several departments at the state capital will be closed to-morrow to enable the heads and employes to be present at the Grand Army parade at Minneapolis.

A young man named Jessie Thomas was arrested last evening on the charge of stealing a carpenter's square from a mechanic employed on the Drake building. He will have a hearing to-day.

The firm of Larson & Co., composed of Andrew L. Larson, Carrie Larson and Hans Anderson, filed an assignment to John C. Nelson in the clerk's office of the district court yesterday in favor of their creditors.

A general meeting of the Ancient Order of Hibernians will be held at their hall, on the corner of Third and Jackson streets to-morrow evening, at 8 o'clock, to discuss urgent business coming before the order.

M. J. Conway, chief of the fifth battalion of the Chicago fire department, called on Chief Black yesterday and took a tour of inspection of the several engine houses. He is in attendance upon the Grand Army festivities.

Col. R. Kiefer has just completed a long lease of certain of his property on Dayton's bluff, near the Post siding. He has leased two dwellings with grounds 100x400 feet in dimensions, for a term of twenty years, at a total rental for the period of \$10,500.
