RUINED BY INDORSEMENTS. Assignment of Lucas Kuehn, the Pioneer Merchant of Wabasha.

A Sequence of the Failure of the [Mazepa] Mill Company.

[Special Telegram to the Globe.] WABASHA, Minn., Sept. 10.—The past week has been one of great excitement here and one which has affected our business interests to a greater extent than was first expected, caused by the failures of the Mazepa Mill and the Minnesota Elevator companies. The first of these failures affected the bank here which, however, stemmed the tide and is in a well fortified condition for the future. But it has seriously crippled Senator Lawrence and caused the almost financial ruin of Lucas Kuehn, the pioneer merchant and most prominent business man of our city, who made an assignment today to Perry Schmeizer, for the benefit of his creditors. The assignment of Mr. Kuehn was not caused by mercantile difficulties, but because he had become the endorser of accommodation to a large amount, and it was to protect his general creditors that the assignment was made.

Mr. Kuehn has been in business here for twenty-five years past and for all that time was identified with all enterprises that were for the benefit of the city. His business occupied three store rooms; and only through accommodation to a friend has he lost the accumulation and result of his success during that period. Though compelled to close his doors there is nothing in the transaction to be placed to his discredit. His credit within mercantile circles has not been impaired by the assignment as it is as good as it was before the assignment was made. He has the entire confidence of everyone that has been doing business with him and all stand ready to sell him again. Though he will lose his all it will not by any means keep him down. As yet I cannot give an estimate of his assets and liabilities, but outside of the paper endorsed all his debts could have been settled within twenty-four hours.

The Wabasha mill, of which Senator Lawrence was president and manager, was yesterday leased to Frank O. Johnson, a gentleman of means and good business capacity, of Winona, which insures the continuance of the important factor of our business interests in the event that Mr. Lawrence goes to the wall.

THE VIRGINIAS. Cleveland Sure to Secure the Electoral Vote of Both.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 9.—Unless all the Democratic reports from West Virginia are incorrect, it is difficult to see upon what the Republicans base their hopes of carrying that state. Mr. Sargent, the editor of a Democratic paper in West Virginia, who is in the city, says that the party enthusiasm there on the Democratic side is greater than he ever remembers to have seen it; that Cleveland clubs have been organized in every village; that unquestionably a full party vote will be cast and that the only question as to result, is how large the Democratic majority will be. He claims that it will be 15,000, and that even Goff, the ablest and most popular of the Republican candidates for congress, will be defeated. The Republicans claim to carry the state unquestionably were based upon expectations as to combinations which have not been realized. It was expected that the fusion between the Greenbackers and the Republicans would be so complete and satisfactory that, aided by a certain popularity for Blaine, the state would be carried for the Republican candidate, but the vision has not been successful, or, at all events, it is not a success. Some of the Republicans claim that the Greenbackers in the districts where the fusion is complete have received the lion's share and there is a great deal of dissatisfaction. There is some reason to believe that Elkins, who apparently had set his heart upon West Virginia in the early part of the year, has abandoned his hopes of carrying the state, and that efforts which are now being made in that direction are a diversion to cover the massing of forces which is now to be made in Ohio.

As for Old Virginia neither Republicans nor reactionaries any longer entertain any thought of the feasibility of securing the electoral vote of that state for the Republican ticket. The feud between Mahon and his readjuster allies has become too intense to admit of reconciliation. Mahon, it can no longer be doubted, would rather face a certain defeat than to surrender one point in the position he has assumed.

Greenbackers at Work. CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 10.—L. E. Crandall, editor of the National View, a Greenback organ printed at Washington, was in the city today, in consultation with several representatives, workmen, and others who favor the election of Gen. Butler. It is supposed the consultation was for the purpose of organizing the Greenbackers of this state.
