CITY GLOBULES.

Alderman I. B. St. Peter moved into his elegant new residence on Stryker avenue, West St. Paul, yesterday.

The funeral of Sister Magdalen St. Agnes, took place from the house of Good Shepard yesterday forenoon.

A grand mass meeting of property owners of St. Paul will be held at the hall of No. 100 North Dakota avenue at 3 o'clock p. m. Sunday, Oct. 5.

Wm. Huggins was taken with a fit, at the corner of Fifth and Jackson streets, yesterday afternoon. He was conveyed home in the patrol wagon.

Judge Brill opened a session of the September term of the district court yesterday morning, and adjourned without doing any business to 10 a. m. this morning.

The full sized portrait in oil of Judge R. R. Nelson, of the United States circuit court, was hung in the supreme court room at the state capitol yesterday.

Sometime during Thursday night vandals broke open the poor box in the vestibule of the cathedral and stole the contents. The amount stolen by the miserable thieves is not known.

The grand jury adjourned upon ten cases yesterday, making twenty-five since they went into session. The robber cases were the first.

It will hardly be ready to report to the court before Tuesday morning.

Thursday night a raid was made upon the Merriam Park station, and a few tickets, an old overcoat and a few articles of no great value were taken. The robber succeeded in getting in by breaking out a pane of glass.

An action was begun in the United States circuit court yesterday afternoon, by Nichols, Shepard & Co. against Gus & A. W. Anderson and Gus Johnson, to enforce the payment of \$200, being an action to collect on a promissory note.

The old Wabasha street wooden bridge is fast disappearing to be replaced with iron, and the timber therein after twelve years use, is in a fine state of preservation. Work is also progressing on the abutment and a stone pier being built on the Sixth ward end.

Adam Holdstedt called at the one-quarter joint, on Eagle street yesterday morning, and after loading to the guards on tannery street, he started for a time. Meeting a married lady on Third street, he slipped on the back and was about to make himself more odious when Officer McMahon ran him in. He was sent to the bastille for thirty days.

An alarm of fire was sent in from box 48, at 6:45 yesterday morning, caused by spontaneous combustion in rags and varnish on the first floor of a one-story frame structure, 320 John street, used by the St. Paul Paint works as a paint and varnish mill. The loss was trifling, and the fire was pronounced by the department to be the result of carelessness.

It was intended to hold a joint consultation last evening at the city hall between the council, county commissioners and the court house commission, as to the new court house building, but no quorum was present, and so an adjournment was had till next Tuesday night, when the matter will be considered, probably by the full council, in connection with the other bodies mentioned.

Judge Reynolds, of Crookston, at the request of the chamber of commerce of that city, sent a line description of the latter to Secretary Young yesterday for incorporation into the new Minnesota state immigration pamphlet now being prepared for the New Orleans exposition. Mr. Young is desirous that other cities to be represented in the work may be prompt in sending in similar contributions.

Yesterday afternoon Judge Burr took up the case of Frederick Sanders, charged on complaint of health physician Dr. Hoyt with peddling ulcerated and cancer-jaw beef. The examination occupied nearly all of the afternoon, the principal witnesses being Dr. Hoyt and Dr. Hand, both of whom described at length the nature of the cancerous and organic disease in cattle. After hearing an indefinite amount of testimony, the court found Sanders guilty of the offense charged in the complaint and sentence was deferred until today.

TRANSPORTATION NOTES.

Eighty Miles of the Dakota and Great Southern Grade to be Ironed.

[St. Paul City Journal, Oct. 3.]

J. H. Deliver, a city engineer, in some sense than one—came in yesterday morning from the work on the Dakota & Great Southern railroad.

To him the reporter is indebted for the information that seventy-eight miles of grade will be completed within ten days. The grade extends from Elliott, on the Fargo & Southwestern, a branch of the Northern Pacific, south to within five miles of Benson, on the Dakota & Great Southern branch of the Milwaukee. As soon as the grade is completed to Elliott the work of track laying will begin at that town and be pushed southward.

It all that is now graded, and if possible grade and iron the five miles additional needed to reach Benson this season. It is the Dakota and Great Southern that is projected to connect Sioux City with Tower City on the Northern Pacific. Gen. Hampt, president of the road, has gone to Europe on financial business connected with the road.

ON TO THE BLACK HILLS.

A reliable man in from northwestern Nebraska says that the engineers of the Elkhorn line have gone north toward Rapid City. They located a line from Gordon City, the west end of the ninety mile Valentine extension, westward twenty-three miles. This carries the line beyond the southwest corner of the great Sioux reservation.

From this point a line is located north, well on Rapid City. It is nearly the line of the Northwestern company to build the branch north to Rapid City at least, perhaps farther into the Black Hills season. The main line is to be continued from the south end of the reservation, west indefinitely.

Report of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy.

The report of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railway company for the year ended June 30, 1884, has been received by the board of railroad and warehouse commissioners. The report shows total receipts, \$143,302,937.37; total length of track, 3,968.31 miles; number of locomotives, 3,352; freight cars, 19,769. An aggregate yearly salary of \$3,654,618.91 is paid to employees.

The earnings of the passenger department for the year were \$2,384,337.89. The freight earnings were \$12,343,113.51, making total transportation earnings \$16,727,451.40. The total operating expenses were \$2,298,890.79. The general operating expenses were \$1,352,400.00, including the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy lines east and west of the Missouri river, shows a total income of \$26,721,850.92. Deducting operating expenses and taxes, a net income remains of \$12,753,045.08. Deducting interest on funded and unfunded debt and rentals, a balance, \$8,308,782.27, remains applicable to dividends. Dividends to the amount of \$3,566,430 were declared, leaving a balance for the year of \$2,742,352.37. During the year eighty persons were killed and 290 injured on the road.

The St. Paul & Duluth.

The road, during the spring and summer months, ran behind the business done during the corresponding months of the previous year, and thus made an unfavorable appearance. It was not generally known that the business of 1883 was for several reasons exceptionally large, so that though the road was doing a good business during the months referred to, yet it had an unfavorable appearance when compared with the unusually large business of the preceding year. For several weeks there has been a very decided improvement in the business of the road and the fourth week in September showed an advance. For this week in 1883 the receipts were \$42,922.48. In 1884 they were \$47,082.08. This shows an increase of \$4,159.60. The whole month of September 1884, showed receipts to the amount of \$1,428,874.41, while the same month for 1883 showed \$1,514,509.21. This presents an increase of \$1,611,671 for the month which is very gratifying.

A New Road from Chicago to St. Paul Proposed.

FREEPORT, Ill., Oct. 2.—There arrived in this city today a party of engineers, who under the charge of Chief Engineer E. Baldwin, will make a survey from here to the Wisconsin line under the auspices of a corporation known as the Chicago & Northwestern, the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road, which proposes to construct a line from Chicago to St. Paul. The president, William O. Wright, is a prominent business man of this city, and the people of this part of the country are taking a great deal of interest in the new line. He stated that it was an independent line, and will be in direct communication with the existing railroad lines of the north and west of the way from Chicago to St. Paul. Work upon it, he said, would be pushed vigorously during the coming summer. In answer to a question he said: "I am not at liberty to state what corporations or syndicate of capitalists are backing this enterprise. I can state, however, that neither the Chicago & Northwestern, the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, nor the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha Railway companies has any interest, except that of rivals, in the construction of this road. A glance at a map showing the whole line will at once satisfy any sensible man that neither of these corporations can be favorably affected by the operation of a line substantially parallel to their existing roads and running through territory of which they now have a complete monopoly. We do not, and will not, ask a dollar for any town on our route until our road is completed and the cars are running to the towns voting the aid."

Rail Notes.

Mr. Hannaford, the general freight agent of the Northern Pacific road, and Mr. Fee, the general passenger agent of the same road, both returned yesterday from Omaha. The business was all transacted, the contract completed and signed, and the meeting adjourned to meet at Denver on the 16th of December next.

The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road took out from the Minnesota transfer thirty cars of cattle yesterday.
