ENTHUSIASTIC DEMOCRATS. The Fourth Ward Cleveland, Hendricks and Merriman Club in Session. The Fourth ward Cleveland, Hendricks and Merriman club met in their club room at the close of the caucus. President J. W. Lawrence in opening the meeting made a brief and pointed address, explaining, as a prelude, the object of the club. He believed that the great reason why the Democrats of the city were not successful at the polls was simply because of a general apathy coupled with the erroneous impression that the city is Republican and consequently that the Democrats have a hopeless cause. So far as this condition from being true the president believed that when the entire Democratic vote is polled victory is certain. The opposition has more wealth than we, campaigns, and therefore the Democrats are compelled to conduct more economic campaigns than do the Republicans.

DR. AMES ADDRESS. Dr. Ames being called for gave an eloquent address. He began by eulogizing the Democratic congressional candidate. He believed the Democrats in the county convention would place before the people for their fruition the best of representative men of the city. That is a policy of the party. With the Republicans the conditions is so very different that the question of capability is never raised. The answer is, Cleveland is an honest man. If there is any doubt of it, read the Republican papers; read of the reception tendered him in his home. So far as the sciences of the campaign are concerned I can only say the Republicans inaugurated it and they have got the worst of it. It would seem that the great and predominant Republican question is whether it would be unwise to enunciate the duty of the Democrats to-morrow is not to consent to placing any man on the ticket who cannot be trusted in every particular. Let each nominee be outspoken and direct. Do not take any assurances from third persons. Compromise every principle and declare the platform and declare it. Let every one make good where he stands. We want no one elected to office who will not stand up for the principles of an ex-convict to pounce upon the people.
