The Democratic county convention met in Pfeiffer's hall at 10 o'clock yesterday forenoon. The convention was called to order by the Hon. Robert A. Smith, who said he would dispense with reading the call. Nominations for a temporary chairman were then called for, and Mr. John B. Oliver was elected to the chair by acclamation.

In accepting the position he made a brief address, saying that the Democracy were on the eve of a close contest, and he expressed the hope that the proceedings of the convention would be conducted in that spirit of harmony that would result in the selection of the strongest candidates.

Prof. F. A. Fogg was then made secretary.

On motion of Chas. W. Ringwald, the chair appointed one from each ward, and one from the country, as a committee on credentials, as follows: First ward, P. T. Kavanagh; Second ward, R. T. O'Connor; Third ward, R. L. Gorman; Fourth ward, Chas. Ringwald; Fifth ward, Wm. Hamm; Sixth ward, E. H. Wood, and Lorenzo Hoyt from the country.

Pending the report of the committee on credentials it was announced by P. H. Kelly that Capt. Merriman was in the hall, and he was invited by the chairman to take a seat on the platform. He was escorted to the platform by Messrs. Lennan, Fuller, White and Willis and proceeded to make an ardent and sensible speech. He said the position was unexpected; he came to St. Paul on business and had been invited to attend the convention as a spectator; the present was not a time for a political speech, and he did not think the convention needed any advice as to the work before them. Still, all good Democrats would be interested at this time in the result of such a gathering.

It was a necessity that unity of action, harmony and patriotism should govern all such bodies; the success of any single man was not to be considered, for, in such a campaign, personalities should be sunk to help the cause; it was necessary for Democrats to come as brothers and not as enemies, and he would be to listening, no fault finding, no whispering behind anyone's back, but the good of the cause alone should be considered, and this would insure success. The address was received with enthusiasm and applause.

Nominations were made by acclamation. The chair then called for nominations for a sheriff, when a motion was made to adjourn until 1 o'clock, but after a short discussion the motion was withdrawn.

Mr. P. H. Kelly then rose and said that he had pleasure in nominating candidates for a sheriff a man whom he thought would honor the Democracy of Ramsey county—a man to whom the Jeffersonian tests of loyalty and capacity would apply, and a man whose Democracy was as good as the best; he named an honest man, Mr. James O'Brien, and he begged leave to nominate for sheriff George Mitsch, Jr.

On motion the nomination was made by acclamation unanimous.

COUNTY AUDITOR. Nominations for county auditor were then called for. Mr. Chas. H. Lennan said that the convention had made a good beginning and he hoped the harmony would continue. For the position of auditor he would nominate a man whom they all knew, a man of whom, when they went into the office they could call him "Jimmy" and he would speak for them.

COUNTY SURVEYOR. The convention then proceeded to select a candidate for county surveyor. The nominations were: E. L. Curtis, J. H. Morris and Henry S. Potts.

The vote stood as follows: Curtis, 2; Morris, 18; Potts, 40. The nomination of Mr. Potts was made unanimous.

On motion of P. H. Kelly the convention took a recess of ten minutes, during which the ward delegations went into caucus to select candidates for the legislature.

At this stage of the proceedings Geo. McLaren loomed up in the hall to pipe things off, but as there was no moss on the chairs he skipped.

After the recess the chair reminded the convention that nominations for legislative candidates were in order.

THE GLOBE CONSIDERED. As the convention was not ready to report the chairman said that he had received communication from the typographical union which he said the secretary would read. The communication was as follows:

Patrick Nash was refunded \$64.90, for an overcharge of a penalty for the construction of the Pleasant avenue, Forbes and Ramsey street sewer.

The mayor informed the council that Mr. Lowry, of the street railway, will soon resume the use of the track on West Seventh street, and the board of public works.

An ordinance was read and referred to the committee on streets to repeal the ordinance adopted some time ago, allowing certain gentlemen authority to fence up a track on University avenue.

An ordinance was adopted modifying in a slight manner the ordinance relating to impounding animals. An ordinance was adopted establishing another public pound, located on block 3 of Fletcher's subdivision of Brewster's addition.

An ordinance was adopted amending an ordinance to protect the streets, alleys and other public grounds of the city, by adding a section requiring the board of water commissioners and the gas light company to lay their main pipes on opposite sides of the street of the city at a distance of not less than twelve feet from the center on such streets as are not less than sixty feet in width and not less than eight feet from the center on such streets as are less than sixty feet in width. The water pipes are to be laid on the northerly and westerly sides of all streets and the gas pipes on the southerly side of the same.
