Survey was commenced yesterday at this end for the proposed elevated railway between St. Paul and Minneapolis.

Capt Thomas Buckley, of engine No. 3, is slowly recovering from a dangerous attack of rheumatic fever at St. Joseph's hospital.

The Minneapolis and St. Paul bicycle clubs are to give an exhibition at the roller skating rink on Jackson street next Friday evening.

The jury in the case of John Clouan vs. the city of St. Paul, in which action was brought for damages, returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff.

The Republicans of the Third and Fourth wards are to be addressed by ex-Gov. C. K. Davis, W. H. Lightner and Gen. MacCarthy, at a hall on Rice street, one block from University avenue, this evening.

O. R. Clark, indicted for the larceny of dry goods from the store of Lindeke, Warner & Schurmeier, was arraigned in the district court yesterday before Judge Brill, and entered a plea of not guilty. He was remanded for trial.

The annual meeting of the Woman's Christian Home will be held at the home, corner of Stillwater and Olmstead street, Friday, the 17, at 2:30 o'clock. All persons interested in the charity are cordially invited to attend.

About 1 o'clock yesterday morning a barn containing about 100 tons of hay, belonging to A. Lenten, at Little Canada, was destroyed by fire. The barn was worth about \$200 and the hay not less than \$1,600. The former was insured for \$200 in the Home of New York, and the hay for \$750 in the same company.

A regular meeting of the board of water commissioners was held yesterday forenoon, Messrs. Hoyt, Kelly and Griggs being in attendance. Bills were examined and allowed amounting to \$9,911.25. A petition for a water main on Nina avenue was granted, when the meeting adjourned.

Yesterday afternoon Judge Brill and a jury took up the case of John Cook against the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railway company, in which action was brought for \$3,000. The plaintiff was injured by a falling wall while at work on the ruins of a water main on Nina avenue on the 11th of June last, and hence the suit for personal injuries. The case is on trial.

An action was brought in the district court yesterday by Timothy Daly against Henry G. Haas for damages of \$1,500, alleged to have been sustained by the actions of the defendant in removing the doors and windows from the residence occupied by plaintiff on Tilton street. The action grew out of an ejection case tried in the police court a couple of weeks ago and particulars of which have appeared in the GLOBE.
