OLD WORLD NEWS. Earl Granville has Carried his Point in Regard to the Congo Conference. Comparative Inactivity of the French and Chinese—Miscellaneous Foreign News.

THE UNITED KINGDOM. LONDON, Oct. 21.—Earl Granville has obtained the assent of the German and French governments to a proposal to limit the work of the Congo conference to the settlement of the Congo question. Earl Granville stipulates this decision shall not be binding unless the vote of delegates be unanimous. The Lisbon Journal of Commerce says the result of the negotiations of the conference will be recognition of the principal sovereignty of Portugal on the lower Congo, under a guarantee of equal trading rights to foreigners and Portuguese. The Frankfurt Gazette predicts the failure of the conference unless English hostility ceases. Says the American government has given Germany a proposal and it will not sustain the enterprise if directed against England. Portugal sides with England rather than risk her pretension to the possession of the mouth of the Congo. Holland, disliking Germany is inclined to see Dutch action in England a strategic movement of which the final object is the annexation of Holland. Italy's colonial interests are opposed to those of the French, and she also supports England.
