County Treasurer Burton paid \$20,000 to City Treasurer Reis yesterday with which the latter paid off the school teachers.

The Public Market restaurant employees give a ball at Pfeiffer's hall to-night, and not at Market hall, as previously announced.

John Williams was pulled yesterday for his reckless driving, and put up \$20 bail for his appearance before Judge Burr this morning.

Peter Murphy, a hackman, complained yesterday that Mike Lynch had drawn a gun on him. The latter will probably be arrested.

An independent referee from New York, now in St. Paul, offers to let from \$100 to \$5,000 that Cleveland will be the next president.

The members of the workhouse commission on yesterday paid a friendly visit to the state reform school. They were chaperoned by City Attorney Murray.

The silver watch raffle, which was to have taken place at West St. Paul this evening for the benefit of a newly laid named Elizabeth McCarthy, is postponed one week.

A fine concert by the First Regiment band led off the dance of the Fourth Ward Hunting club at Pfeiffer hall last evening which proved to be a highly enjoyable occasion.

The state library was enriched yesterday by the addition of Demore's surrogate reports of New York and the twenty-seventh volume of the observations at the naval observatory at Washington.

John Regan and Win. McBean, hands on the government snag steamer, when they put in an appearance for lodging at the city hall last night in a drunken condition, had the key turned on them for vagrancy.

The district court will take up the case of Emma Brown for larceny this morning. The next case in order being that of James Broderick for the robbery of Nils Olson of \$3, being arrested at the time with a dangerous weapon.

Otto Peterson and James Swenson, who after the larceny of \$40 from the St. Thomas hotel, stole a coat and sailed down to La Crosse, where they were arrested by Detective Ahern on Thursday, were taken to the county jail yesterday.

The turnkeys in the county jail do not think Mattie Norman is insane, on suspicion of which she was committed to that institution on Thursday evening. She is a domestic and complains bitterly of her wages being withheld by her employers.

The prosecution of the Dayton's Bluff Republican club, headed by a band on route for the Market hall meeting last evening didn't pan out worth a cent in numbers, while the team club of the Second ward, headed by ten drums made such a meagre show as to excite much comment on the streets.

Alexander Ronald, formerly a clerk in the United States hotel on Fifth street, filed a complaint for divorce against his wife, Lillian Ronald, in the district court yesterday on the ground of adultery with divers unknown persons. They were married in Chicago and have lived in St. Paul about two years.

The still alarm of fire at 9 o'clock on Thursday evening was caused by a shower of sparks being sent coming out of a chimney in Lytle's new block on the corner of Tenth and Cedar streets, in which the department found a bluff old fellow who was keeping up the place fire to dry the plastering and who told them he had all the water he wanted in the mortar.

Three of a Kind.

Another enjoyable performance of "Micalza, or A Double Life," was given at the Grand last night, and only two more opportunities remain to witness this admirable play. A grand matinee performance is announced for this afternoon, and the engagement will close to-night.

Yesterday Morning's Fires.

The losses and insurance in the Sixth ward fire yesterday morning are as follows:

Wm. Reimer, two buildings used by him for feed store, blacksmith and wagon shops, loss on buildings and contents \$1,000, insured for \$550; Reimer's loss on saloon building \$300 and insured for \$400. C. H. Miller, the occupant's loss being \$500 and insured for that amount; loss on Reimer's butcher shop building, which had no tenant, \$400 and insured for \$600. The origin of the fire is unknown.

An alarm was sent in on box 43, at 3:51 yesterday morning, caused by the burning of a frame barn owned by Geo. Sherwood and occupied by C. Corran, the origin of this fire being unknown. The structure was thoroughly gutted and four horses roasted therein. The loss on the building was \$300 and on contents \$675 which latter were insured for \$450.

At this fire while five of the truckmen were on the second floor it gave way and they were precipitated to the ground floor but without injury. Not so however with Martin Myler, pipeman of No. 3 engine, detailed on No. 2 truck, who was standing on a ladder raised from the sidewalk when the floor suddenly twisted round throwing him from his foot hold on the same, and on a level with the second floor of the barn to the plank walk below, and it is thought fracturing his skull. He was not made insensible by the blow and Dr. Abbott, his attending physician, was not ready to state last evening whether his injuries were of a serious character or not.

At this fire a hose and nozzle became unmanageable in the hands of several firemen and a stream of 100 pounds pressure struck Chief Black at a distance of eight feet from the pipe in the ear, which gave him a stiff neck but did not hurt him.
